the newspaper's advisory board. The person chosen will take over as editor on June 1, but there are few choices among current staff members to fill the positions.

"I've only heard one or two people mention any interest in theeditor position," Embrees aid. "I know there will be writers and staff position people, but as far as the editor goes, and as far as section editors, I don't know what's going to happen next year."

Such a scenario should never take place, according to *Rebel Yell* opinion editor Scott Gulbransen. He feels the blame lies at the hands of the department.

"I don't think the school has organized itself well enough," Gulbransen commented. "You should have to take a core set of classes, and there is no way you should vary from that."

Communication majors at UNLV are only required to take five specific communication classes. Oral Communication, Newsgathering & Writing I and Mass Media Law are mandatory, as well as two survey classes from a list of three possibilities. Aside from those 15 credits, students must complete 21 additional communication credits. There is no requirement to take any specific courses in a particular field of emphasis, and therein, according to some, lies the problem.

The Greenspun School is not an accredited college and therefore is not held to any outside standards regarding what courses its students must complete in order to obtain their degree.

The purpose of accreditation is to insure, through the use of uniform criteria and guidelines, thatstudents will be taught along the basic accepted standards of an accrediting body, regardless of where they studied. Accreditation can be obtained by various regional or national bodies, depending on the type of the school applying.

A recent study conducted by the American Society of Newspaper Editors indicated that most editors desire to know if job candidates graduated from an accredited school of journalism.

Gulbransen compared the situation at UNLV to that at the University of Nevada, Reno, which has a highly renowned and accredited journalism school.

"That's the biggest difference between here and Nevada, where it's set in stone," Gulbransen said. "If you're going to go through Reno and be a print journalist, you have to take certain classes, you have to write." a minumun of seven articles to

graduate. Gulbransen, who also works as assistant sports director at KUNV, has voiced his concerns about these issues in his workly.

about these issues in his weekly column in *The Rebel Yell* but said he has received no response from the Greenspun School about his complaints.

"Many of the students don't have any idea of what they need to do to get a job or how to prepare themselves for the job market, and the Greenspun School is not preparing them," Gulbransen said. "The teachers in the department need to instill that you have to write for *The Rebel Yell* or else you're not going to get a job in the print field."

KUNV shares *The Rebel Yell's* problems of no department requirements for student involvement. Until the radiostation gets more cooperation from the communication department and university, Fuller said he doesn't see the station improving its ability to serve its staff members.

The Greenspun School has created the positions of promotions manager and underwriting director in conjunction with KUNV, but both are listed as internship or independent study credit opportunities. Regardless of this, students won't get as much as they could out of these positions because of space limitations at the station, according to Fuller.

"We want to get students working up here, but the way things are, we couldn't even give them their own desk to work at," Fuller said, adding the answer to the problems between KUNV and the university can be found by working in unison.

ing in unison. "We are all isolated into little groups; the newspaper, the radio station, the school," Fuller said. "It would make more sense, and provide a better education for the students, if we worked together a little more."

Of the three student media outlets, only UNLV-TV's Newscenter 4 seemed satisfied with its current relationship with the Greenspun School.

Erika Engstrom, news director of UNLV-TV and a member of the Greenspun faculty, said her only complaints with the department come from the need for a few pieces of new equipment.

But with two out of three student media outlets voicing serious complaints about their status with the Greenspun School, those involved feel the situation must come under closer scrutiny from both administrators and students. Many see accreditation of the Greenspun School as a logical first step toward resolving the various problems. Embree agrees it will help. "However," he emphasized, "the school will never be accredited without a practicum."


