T&M and Sam **Boyd Stadium** parking fees increased

Parking fees for events held at the Thomas & Mack Center and the Sam Boyd Stadium have been increased from \$3 to \$4 per vehicle and from \$5 to \$6 for recreational vehicles.

According to T&M officials, the fee increase will help cover rising maintenance costs which have developed due to the growth in the UNLV stu-dent population, the widen-ing of Tropicana Avenue and several construction projects.

Pat Christenson, director for the T&M and Sam Boyd Stadium, said, "We have kept our parking fees the same since 1990, but unfortunately our maintenance expenses continue to rise. Both facilities have continual expenses associated with resurfacing, restriping, paving and maintenance."

Some of the parking lots at the T&M will need to be changed or upgraded, and the new parking areas at the in-tersection of Tropicana Avenue and Paradise Road have also added to the overall maintenance budget.

The parking fee increase will allow the T&M and Sam Boyd Stadium management to follow a legislative mandate to operate these facilities without taxpayer assistance.

from page 1 officials expect to pass bond issues and pay them back through parking fees. Amend said revenues generated from parking meters and parking fines will also help pay for the parking structures.

Parking permits are being issued by UNLV Parking and Traffic Enforcement at: UNLV Department of Public Safety, Artemus Ham Hall Box Office, the information booth at Moyer Student Union and the Education Continuing Department at Frazier Hall.

Hanging permits will be provided for multiple vehicle registration at no additional cost. Also, no additional permit is required for vehicles parked in designated handicap spots bearing the proper identification.

Annual, nine month, semester and summer permits will allow parking in designated permit areas at any time, including parking for events held at the Thomas & Mack.

Student reaction to the implementation of parking fees varies.

Rita Gonzalez, a criminal justice major, and a member of Parking Enforcement said, "We've been spoiled with free parking for so long that people are very upset about having to pay and are taking out their anger on us (Parking Enforcement). However, not everyone responded favorably to the fee.

"I think it's too much. The fee is ridiculous," said Brenda Laporte, an English graduate
