SCS enacts new fee

Once again, 1995 seems to be the year of the rising cost and a year in which free university services are disappearing. System Computing Services has now instituted a \$10 fee for their computer instruction seminars.

The seminars, which have been offered for free in past years, cover popular computer applications such as Microsoft Word, Excel and PageMaker, as well as basic instruction on operating systems such as Microsoft Windows, Macintosh and Unix.

The fee was instituted after the fall seminar catalogs were printed. Students and faculty calling to register for the seminars will be advised of the new fee. Officials at System **Computing Services expressed** regret at the timing of the fee enactment, but not at the fee itself, which would have gone into effect in the spring semester anyway.

The new charge for the seminars comes in response to the rising demand for the services

provided by SCS such as Internet access, training seminars, and support for people with questions regarding their computers.

Demand for these services has been rising steadily through the years, but as is common with most public services, the budget has not. As a result of this fiscal imbalance SCS took a look at their cost structure and decided that the seminars were the service that would be the best place to create revenue.

System Computing Services North, which serves the University of Nevada, Reno and the community colleges of the northern portion of the state has charged fees for its seminars for some time now and their enrollment rates have stayed constant.

By way of comparison, the cost of taking a class in a common word processing application such as WordPerfect, from a private teaching company such as New Horizons would cost \$225. The same instruction from SCS which would comprise a WordPerfect I and II seminar would cost \$20.

Biology professor awarded grant

The National Science Foundation has awarded Stan Smith, a UNLV biological sciences professor, a three-year grant for \$415,000 for his project titled "Effects of Elevated CO, on a Mojave Desert Ecosystem."

The project involves the installation of a Free Air Carbon Dioxide Enrichment (FACE) facility at the Nevada Test Site.

It will fumigate plots of undisturbed desert on a con-tinuous basis with elevated carbon dioxide and will examine ecosystem responses to elevated CO, levels.
