press time, the Registrar's office reported an enrollment decrease of 1,600 students.

"This could cause UNLV real problems if we don't realize the projected enrollment. If our enrollment drops, our income drops, thus we end up with less money in our budget than we expected to make, and this would hurt the campus, he said.

A hiring freeze for the university is also in effect According to Regen Shelly Berk-ley, UNLV has exceeded its formula funding in previous years. In effect, the university has hired more faculty than needed for students. "As positions open, the university will be more selective in hiring," she said.

The administration announced a change in the evaluation process of itself. Provost Smith said that the administration felt it needed time to ensure an objective evaluation. "What I'm suggesting is these comprehensive evaluations be done every two to three years because it takes that long to learn about their job," Smith said.

"If there's one message that I would like to convey to the university is to give President (Carol) Harter and the new administrators a chance."

Action to lower student government VP's stipend tabled

A proposed Student Senate action to lower Vice President Joe Mills' stipend was tabled at Monday's meeting, due to fear of legal reprisals.

Attorney Shannon Bybee warned the Senate of a possi-

ble breach of contract if it voted to lower Mills stipend.


