# New faces ready to step up for UNLV Football

### Rebels have many new players to fill old shoes

With only a few starters returning, the 1995 Rebel football team will sport a new look with a host of new faces that will get their chance to see action on the field.

Head Coach Jeff Horton has been impressed by the intensity and eagerness of some of the younger players and has had some pleasant surprises in spring and fall camps.

Redshirt freshman Kevin Crook is being groomed as the quarterback of the future as UNLV heads for the Western Athletic Conference next year.

"Crook has all of the tools to be a great quarterback," Horton said. "He has size and a great arm."

Crook might have some competition from true freshman Jon Denton, who opened the eyes of coaches in last Saturday's scrimmage at Rebel Park. Denton showed poise by throwing a 60-yard touchdown one play after being sacked.

"Denton is a confident quarterback," Horton said. "He is cocky and walks with a swagger. He is a Jim McMahon type of quarterback." Redshirt freshman right

Redshirt freshman right tackle and honors student Mike Reily has won the starting job in camp.

"Mike is a tough kid with good values and a great football sense," Horton said.

Another redshirt freshman, left guard Jerald Pierucci, will get to start. He has put on weight over the off season and Horton believes he will be a big contributor on the line for the next four years.

Two sophomores who should be catching some balls this year are Todd Floyd and Kwame Coleman.

Floyd, a long time friend of Horton and transfer from Reno, is the kind of receiver who will come down with the ball in traffic.

"Todd is a great competitor," Horton said. "He has the kind of body that gets knocked around a lot but he always seems to come up with the ball."

Coleman, the only receiver returning who saw action last year, should become a major contributor. He will be filling the shoes of departed senior, Henry Bailey.

Junior running back Tony Burton will start Saturday against Rice. Burton is a transfer from Palomar JC in San

Marcos, Calif. Burton ran for over 1,000 yards in each of his two seasons at Palomar.

"Tony was one of the top junior college runners in the country," Horton said. "I like his speed and quickness but he has to prove he's durable."

Sophomores Mike Bell and Jason Toohey will split time at receiver. Toohey does not have great speed but Horton was impressed by his ability to catch the ball. "He has the best hands I have ever seen," Horton said.

On the defensive side of the ball, only three starters remain. A host of players who lack experience will have to step up to keep the offense in games.

Senior linebacker P.J. Tyler has impressed the coaching staff in camp. He saw action last season on special teams and will get the start this season


Senior free safety Jabbar Thomas, a former running back transplanted to the secondary after the seventh game of the season, is on Horton's list for success.
