Kalu tied a Rice record last year with eight sacks including two in the Owls first victory against the University of Texas Longhorns in 28 years.

Senior Jared Brown will be the Rebel's starting quarterback, but he will share time with Senior Jason Davis.

"The way the game goes will dictate how much Jason plays," Horton said. "He will play at least two series."

Due to the injury of DeJohn Branch, who has ligament damage in his knee, junior Tony Burton will be the starting tailback and will split time with senior Shannon Wilson (formerly Shannon McLean).

Branch will miss 3-4 weeks and could be back as soon as the September 16 game against Eastern Michigan.

While awaiting Branch's return, Horton is confident Burton can get the job done.

"He is as quick as any back on the West Coast," Horton

The return of senior Demond Thompkins after a year of ineligibility should provide some offensive firepower. Horton wants to get the speedy receiver involved with the running game as well.

According to Horton, Thompkins is one of the top three receivers in the conference and has a chance to break Henry Bailey's receiving records early in the season.

"Rice is a tough team who beat some quality people in Texas and Texas Tech last year," Horton said. "The game will be a real good way to start the season and to prepare us for some tough conference games down the road."

Walk-on Marshall Mathews got the nod from Horton as the last-minute choice at place kicker. Also travelling with the team will be freshman kicker Matt Rhea.

The game will be the first of three televised games this season. The broadcast will air Saturday at 5 p.m. on KUPN-21 (Cable 2).



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
