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"There is no time to rebuild," Horton said. "We do have a lot of new guys, but our goals still are to win the league and defend our championship in the Las Vegas Bowl."

With this fresh look, the depth of the Rebels has become what Horton calls thin. "There are 62 guys on the team, and we are shallow on defense."

Guys who have not been looked upon in the past season to move forward with the team may have to do just that on the defensive side of the ball.

"Last year there were questions about our quaterbacks who stepped up toward the end of the year," Horton said. "This year it is the linebackers who will have to step up for us on defense."

With questions arising in the past few weeks regarding different aspects of the Rebels starting core another one was added to the mix which Horton did not expect. A couple of weeks ago, running back DeJohn Branch sprained his knee in practice and word got out that he would be gone for 3-4 weeks.

Branch was last season's hero in the win against Reno as well as the Las Vegas Bowl trouncing of Central Michigan. In those two games, Branch lit up the opposing defenses for 286 rushing yards and scored the touchdown that delivered the Rebels the Big West Co-Championship against the Wolf-

No doubt this hurts the Rebels running game, Horton explained, because once he got his act together Branch put up some big numbers. "Both (Shannon) Wilson and (Tony) Burton will have to step up to get the running game going this season."

But as always it will be the throwin' Rebels. "It's what I like to do, its excitement," Horton exclaimed. Although his receiving corps is unproven, Horton is not afraid to send the ball through the air to the young group of kids.

Last season questions ran rampant throughout the Rebel camp during the summer as well as the early going of the season. But Horton stood there calmly and said to just keep watching. We all know how that ended up.

This season questions are flying and Horton still looks to be calm and ready to face the new season.


