from the 38-0 shutout at Rice? Will a receiver step up to fill the shoes of the academically ineligible Demond Thompkins as a deep threat? Will quarterback Jared Brown put his three interceptions against the. Owls in the past and lead the team to victory?

All these questions will be answered at Sam Boyd Stadium Saturday at 7 p.m. in front of a sold out stadium.

The Arkansas State Indians, who did not win a conference game last season and went 1-10 overall, are returning 18 starters (8 offense, 7 defense, 3 specialists) and are coming off a 21-17 Big West Conference home win against Utah State.


