## Parking permit theft on the rise

During the first two weeks of school 14 UNLV parking permits were stolen from vehicles parked on campus.

The Public Safety Department is taking the matter seriously. "We're going to nail these guys," said Kelly Stuehling, management assistant at Public Safety.

The overwhelming majority of stolen permits are taken from vehicles that are unlocked or have their windows rolled down. According to Stuehling, there doesn't seem to be any organized group that is responsible for the thefts.

The permits are usually stolen by the average person who sees an easy opportunity and thinks, 'If I take that, I won't have to pay for parking," Steuehling said. A person caught stealing

a permit is subject to criminal prosecution, a parking citation and could have their vehicle towed at the owner's expense. Thieves are also subject to a possession of stolen property

Public Safety urges students and faculty to report stolen permits immediately. The sooner the department places the permit on its list of stolen permits, the sooner they can be on the lookout for the permit.

The replacement fee for a stolen permit is \$5, which covers the administrative and printing costs to reissue a permit.

For questions about reporting a theft, obtaining a replacement permit or reporting someone who is in possession of a stolen permit call the Public Safety Department at 895-3668.




### Interactive video presentation
