Davis sets record in win against Rebels

Sophomore running back Troy Davis humbled the Rebel defense in a record-breaking performance in UNLV's 57-30 loss to the Iowa State Cyclones at Ames, Iowa.

Davis broke his own school record of 291 yards he set against Ohio University earlier this season. He ran for 302 yards on 36 carries before being relieved midway through the third quarter. Davis ran for five touchdowns.

"Unfortunately, I got to see (the performance) first hand," Coach Jeff Horton said. "He is a quick, fast back who is hard to tackle. He did a tremendous job."

The Cyclone running game combined for 586 yards against the Rebels, the most ever gained on the ground against a Rebel squad. The total was 35 yards more than the Central Michigan Chipewas gained against UNLV last season.

Starting quarterback Jason Davis, who completed 5-of-9 passes for 52 yards, was

yanked in the second half in favor of Jared Brown. Brown finished the game with 19-of-28 passing for 244 yards and one interception. Brown increased his season interception total to seven in just 10 quarters of play.

"The offense sputtered in the first half and I thought we needed to make a change," Horton said. "We need to find a way to come out of the chute good and run on all cylinders."

The Rebels, who were ranked 20th in the nation rushing coming into the game, gained just 78 yards on 31 attempts. The ISU team, who was 101th in the nation against the run, stuffed the Rebel running attack all afternoon. Brown accounted for 26 of the Rebel's ground yards, most of which were gained while running for his life.

"I was disappointed in our running attack," Horton said. "We have to run the ball well to win games. Our passing game has gotten better but we need to have both to be successful."

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Soccer invitational saddled with problems

Rebels lose two in home tourney

The UNLV soccer team fell to 3-4-3 as they lost both games in the weekend Coors Light Invitational.

First there were the off-the-field distractions for the Rebels. When cheering the squad on, a cheerleader was dropped during a routine, requiring medical attention. Also, attendance was down to only 220 fans for the second game against Northern Illinois.

The positive side of the tournament was the exciting half-time youth soccer game, which was almost as good as the real game.

As for the Kickin' Rebels, their weekend was atypical to their usual performance. The shaky outing was symbolized by the play of Rebel goalie Dan Abdalla, who let another fluke goal get into the net.

In Friday's game, the Rebels lost 2-0 to Texas

Christian University. It was a match where the defense failed on two occasions.

On the first TCU goal, the Horned Frogs scored off a corner kick to put them on the board. Two minutes later, TCU caught the Rebel defense napping again. With the Horned Frog goalie set to kick the ball out of the box, he used his powerful punt to give a TCU forward a break away and the team's second goal.

Give credited to the Horned Frogs for taking advantage of the weak Rebels. Even the TCU goalie got on the scorecard with an assist on the

second goal.

The second game proved to be no different for the Rebels who were defeated in a thriller, 3-2, by the Northern Illinois Huskies.

In the fourth minute of the match, the Huskies struck first when Chris Stier scored on a rocket from 25 yards out. This spinning shot hit the cross-bar and went directly off of goalie Abdalla into the goal.

However, the Rebels answered back in the 32nd minute to knot the game up at one. On this goal, credit should be given to big James

Mitchell (6-1, 190) who acted like a tight-end and muscled his way through the Northern Illinois backfield. Mitchell gave a picture-perfect pass to Bart Gallia right in front of the goal and Gallia put it away, tying the score 1-1.

UNLV dodged a bullet in the 56th minute when a Huskie shot raced over the head of Abdalla, hitting the cross-bar before a Rebel defender could clear it away.
