


PHOTO BY HYUN-HO HAN Forward Michael Griego attempts to score with header over a Northern Illinois goalie in the Coors Light Invitational.

As for the second game, the Rebels let the opportunity to win the game fly by when Gr-




Junior Michael Vance swings to tenth position in the Tucker Golf Classic at the University of New Mexico. The Golf squad captured a first place tournament championship.
