Participants included Harvard University, the University of Michigan, Dartmouth College, Baylor University, and the University of Texas.

The debate team of freshman Rick Kimbrough andsophomore Michelle Matlock competed against teams from 37 universities and colleges. They defeating the University of North Carolina, Mercer, University of Kansas, and Augustana.

Eight students attended the University of Utah Scrimmage held in Salt Lake City. Sophomores E.J. them with the University of New Mexico for third place. Whitaker placed fifth in Exteporaneous Speaking, while Gladding placed fifth in After Dinner Speaking. Gladding and Whitaker also placed seventh in Dramatic Duo Interpretation.

National Depression Screening Day

Depression strikes more than 17 million Americans each year, according to figures from the National Institute of Mental Health. Treatment can help approximately 80 percent of people suffering from this illness. Still, fewer than half of those afflicted seek treatment.

Student Psychological Services will be offering free screening for depression on Wednesday, in the Fireside Lounge of the Mover Student Union. The program

is offered free to all UNLV stu-

"Depression is one of the most frequent problems for which students seek help from our center, " said Steven Oster, a counselor at Student Psychological Services.

National Depression Screning Day was developed five years ago by Harvard psychiatrist Dr. Douglas Jacobs, and is held each year during Mental Illness Awareness Week. More than 82,000 people last year attended screenings at 2,000 sites nationwide.

The program is designed to educate students about the signs and symptoms of depression and to encourage those who are suffering from depression to seek evaluation and treatment.

Students participating in the screening will hear a brief lecture relating to the causes, symptoms, and treatments of depression. In addition, participants will view a short video and will complete an anonymous written screening test. Mental health professionals will be on hand to discuss with students any questions they might have regarding the test results.


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
