"We have gone from a nurse's center to an ambulatory care center," Winchell said.

Services offered to the 70-plus students seen each day at the health center include: free doctors visits, free safe sex kits, free aspirin and cold tablets, as well as prescriptions offered at wholesale prices at the health center pharmacy.

These services are vital because 30 percent of the students seen as patients lack medical insurance, according to Winchell. Another 20 percent are underinsured, unable to meet deductibles, or belong to a health plan not accessible in Clark County.

"I'm interested in hearing from students about what they'd like to see happen," Winchell said. "This is their health center."

An assessment committee consisting of UNLV faculty, students and medical professionals is being formed this semester to determine the needs and expectations of UNLV students concerning the health center.

"We are faced with the broad charge of revising the scope of the health center and making it a reality for the future of the center," said Terry Piper, assistant vice president for student life.

The LGBA meets 8 p.m. Tuesday nights in MSU Room 210 south. For information on upcoming events or to leave a voice mail call 594-GAYS.

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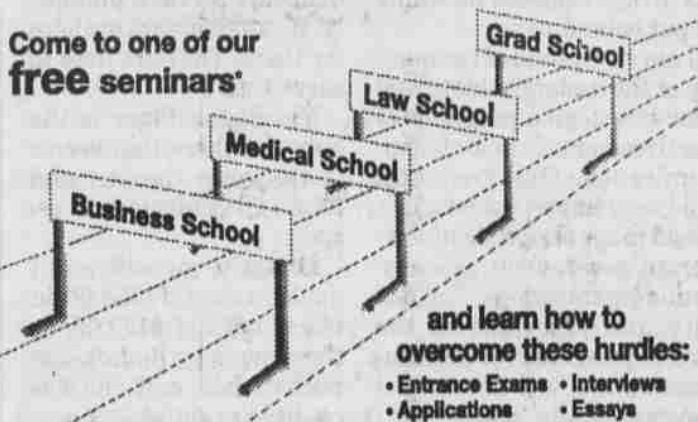
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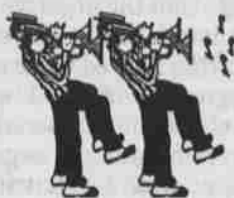
