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Rebels to face NIU Saturday

The Rebels will try to get back on track at 1 p.m. Saturday when they travel to De-Kalb, Illinois to face Big West Conference foe Northern Illinois University at Huskie Stadium.

The Rebels, coming off three consecutive losses where the opponents scored more than 50 points, have a chance to rectify their season while entering the conference part of their schedule. Five of the Rebels last six games will be against conference opponents and three of the six will be at Sam Boyd Stadium.

Despite a 1-4 overall record, UNLV is still 1-0 in conference play and only one half game behind the league leading NIU Huskies in the Big West Conference standings.

A strong late-season surge can put the Rebels back in the hunt for their second straight division championship.

"We have as good of a shot as anybody," Coach Jeff Horton said. "We have a five game season left to play. We have to approach it one game at a time. We are getting better and that is the key."

The Huskies, who are 2-3 overall and 2-0 in the BWC, are a team that likes to run the ball. This aspect of the NIU offense may spell disaster for the Rebels who have given up 1022 rushing yards in the last two games. UNLV ranks dead last in rushing defense in the Big West, giving up an average of 341.6 yards a game.

The Huskies will try to dominate the Rebels with their

physical style of play. The NIU starting offensive linemen average over 300 pounds and the Huskies have two big runners in 221 pound fullback Anthony Griffin and 229 pound tailback Charles Talley.

"They (NIU) run the ball really well and are really big up front," Horton said. "They are big and physical much like the Central Michigan team was a year ago."

"They are real good at trick plays," Horton added.

The Rebels are in a first quarter scoring drought that has lasted all season long. Horton has stressed the importance of playing all four quarters to the players in practice this week.

"We need to play it a quarter at a time and win each quartech it that way to be successful."

UNLV has had trouble on the road lately. They have lost five straight on the road and their last road win came October of last year when they beat New Mexico State in Las Cruces, New Mexico.

The Rebels will try to keep their offense going this week at DeKalb. UNLV is averaging 400.4 yards of offense per game, which is fifth in the conference. The Rebel's rushing offense is the league's second best with an average of 186.6 per game.

UNLV is 0-2 lifetime against the Huskies and Saturday's game will be the clubs' first meeting as conference rivals. The Huskies and the Rebels will leave the Big West next year, going to the Mid-American Conference and the Western Athletic Conference.

Soccer hoping to upset UCLA

The UNLV soccer team will try to put the brakes on a four game losing streak when they travel to UCLA this weekend.

The Rebels (3-6-2, 0-0-0) will have upset on their minds since the Bruins are ranked No. 2 in the nation (8-1-0, 1-0-0) and have beat the Rebels five straight and have not lost in the last nine meetings.

UNLV is 2-14-2 against the Bruins overall.

Chances for the Rebels to make the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation playoffs will rest this weekend on how well they do against the Bruins on Friday and UC Irvine on Sunday. If they lose once against any division team they could lose their chance to see postseason play.

The last time the Rebels beat the Bruins was 1984, when they blanked them 3-0. The Kickin' Rebels are 1-8-0 when playing in Los Angeles. The Kickin' Rebels have never lost to UC Irvine in 16 matches.

Golfer shines in a shadow

Morales making a name for himself as No. 2 golfer

When you think of UNLV golf, you think of one golfer — Chris Riley. However, it takes a team effort to be the top ranked golf team in the coun-

try.
Helping Riley lead the Swingin' Rebels is Venezuelan native Gilberto Morales. After finishing second overall, and first on the Rebel squad in the William H. Tucker tournament to start the season, Morales has proven to be a consistent golfer and team leader.

"Gilberto is one of the players on the team who's capable of winning the individual national championship," coach Dwaine Knight said.

Morales comes to UNLV with several junior achievements under his belt. "He came to us with great credentials from junior golf." Knight said.

As a junior golfer, Morales captured two World Championships and the Rolex Tournament of Champions championship in 1993, where he

shot a six-under 282. In the 1992 Junior World Championship, Morales defeated junior golf sensation Tiger Woods at the Torrey Pines South Country Club. Against Woods and many other top golfers, Morales shot a nine-under 279.

One of Morales' best tournaments came at the Doug Sanders World Junior Championship in Aberdeen, Scotland, where he shot a remarkable 16 under par, 272. His last round of the tournament he pulled in a round of 65.

Morales was named South American Junior Player of the Year after winning the 1992 South American Junior Championship in Peru. He is the No. 1 amateur in his native homeland Venezuela.

"I had a real good junior career, the sacrifice really paid off," Morales said.

Morales, a communications major, is not only at UNLV to golf, he is here to get an education. "Academics first, I want to graduate and get my degree before I start any golf career," Morales said.

"Gilberto is doing very well this year in school and that has made him focus on golf," Knight said on the academic success of his star golfer.
