from pg. 1 working days, the AA officer will tries to resolve the situation between the two parties. If a resolution does not meet with the complainant's satisfaction, the charge becomes formal.

The AA officer then expands the investigation, interviews witnesses and prepares a report for the president. In some circumstances, a grievance committee is required. The committee is appointed by the president, and is required to form within three working days of the close of the AA officer's investigation. The grievance committee then makes a recommendation to the president on the conclusion of their deliberations within 10 working days The president then takes the necessary action and notifies the AA officer.

Regent Shelley Berkley, who is a member of the committee, said it has made "tremendous strides on the issue of sexual harassment."

"There is still a lot more work to be done," Berkley said.
"While I don't believe in legislating morality, the regents must be definitive in their position that you keep your hands off the coeds."

She addressed criticism of false sexual harassment charges by suggesting that the university system streamline the charge procedures and promote more education on acceptable behavior.

The committee, established in 1990, was not only created to address sexual harassment but also to address under-representation of women in all university system positions, campus safety, date rape, child care facility adequacy and supporting re-entry programs that enhance female student retention.

Since its creation, the committee has gathered data on conditions within the system and has created an interim report of campus committee recommendations to their institutions meeting gender equity goals and presenting seminars on sexual harassment.

Metro robbery Lt. Wayne Petersen said the trouble began after Mosca confronted one of the youths who tried to shoplift a compact disc.

After the confrontation, Petersen said several other youths started to steal merchandise. Mosca was knocked to the ground and hit her head on the pavement when she tried to stop people from leaving the store.

Brendan O'Toole, a professor in the mechanical engineering department, said Mosca is " a real good student, she's real active in the engineering student societies."

She was involved in the human-powered vehicle design project that won first place national honors during the summer at the Associated Students Engineers, Region 9 competition.


"All of the students knew her pretty well, and everyone's shaken up, they're pretty shocked," O'Toole said.

Petersen said another female, an 18-year-old, followed the group out of the store and was punched in the nose. She was treated and released from UMC.
