Gallop addresses sexual harassment

Jane Gallop, Ph.D., feminist, author, and professor of critical literature, gave her analysis of sexual harassment at a seminar Friday at UNLV.

The event was sponsored by the University Forum and the Women's Studies program. A crowd of approximately 60 people attended.

Gallop, a professor at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee said, "My goal is to try to make people aware that something is going wrong in people's understanding of sexual harassment."

In 1992, Gallop was accused of sexual harassment by two of her female graduate students. After an investigation, it was determined that Gallop was not at fault.

She is now writing a book entitled *Feminist Accused of Sexual Harassment*. She shared the first chapter of the unfinished book with the audience and ended with a brief question and answer period.

"As a feminist theorist of sexuality, I consider it my business to understand sexu-

al harassment," Gallop said.

"Feminism is directly responsible for bringing harassment to public awareness," said Gallop. "I am troubled by this limitless definition, (of sexual harassment)," Gallop added.

It is this all-encompassing concept that Gallop claims caused the accusations of her, simply because of the way she teaches. "If I had to give up that way of teaching I would be giving up everything I value about what I do."

Gallop has no intention of giving up her teaching techniques. She stands behind her teaching style and instead faults the current policies. "Rather than changing myself I am trying to change the policies."

Gallop's avenue of directional change is writing about and discussing the issue. "Perhaps, someday, my ideas will change our country's views about the sexual harassment issue."

Student Valerie Hughes, a junior, attended the lecture and said, "I think it expands our thinking on the issue of what we call sexual harassment."
