Rebels keep play-off chances alive

The UNLV soccer team is barely keeping their heads above water as they went 1-1 this past weekend against UC Santa Barbara.

To earn a conference playoff berth, the Rebels need to win their last regular season game against New Mexico on Wednesday and hope that Cal-State Northridge can defeat UCSB on Friday.

The Rebels inched closer to the play-offs by defeating UC Santa Barbara on Friday. On the last home game of the season, UNLV took advantage of two UCSB ejections to capture the victory in overtime fashion.

This blood-bath of a contest saw three ejections and eight yellow cards issued. For the Rebels, senior captain Coby Holt was ejected for a foul play. And for the Gauchos, leading scorer Jason Deal and second leading score Jeff Johnson were ejected. Johnson's ejection in overtime proved to be detrimental because it gave the Rebels a penalty kick and a 10- to 9-man advantage for the remainder of the overtime session.

UCSB started the scoring off early as Ryan Schomberg headed in a cross pass from five feet out in the 13th minute.

The Rebels answered back in at the start of the second halfwhen senior James Mitchell scored off a header from Brian Wilson.

The game stayed knotted at one for the remainder of the game, forcing overtime. Both squads were tense, since this'



In the overtime, the Rebels caught a break when Jeff Johnson picked up his second yellow card by fouling a Rebel in the box. Johnson was escorted off the field, and Wilson netted the penalty kick to place the Rebels on top of the scoreboard.

The Rebels held off the threatening Gauchos for the rest of the match to earn a conference victory.

With the win, the Rebels moved to 3-1-1 in the Pacific division of the MPSF conference. The victory also increased the team's chances of receiving the conference's last

tournament berth. UNLV, which hasn't tasted the post-season since 1988, traveled to Cal State Northridge for a Sunday evening battle.

After a scoreless first-half, the Kickin' Rebels scored the game's first goal when James Mitchell scored in the 56th

minute. This goal gave the Rebels a 1-0 lead.

However, Matador superstar Keith West scored twice to put Cal State Northridge ahead. Juan Sastoque scored another Matador goal to secure the Northridge victory.

This loss hurts UNLV's playoff chances, but doesn't kill
