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"The fact is I have now made 31 speeches to public groups on the outside of the university that are very, very important to the future of this university and to students," Harter said.

Reffering to an editorial in the Oct. 24 issue of The Rebel Yell which spoke of Harter's lack of student interaction, Harter said, "I thought the editorial in The Rebel Yell was awful and inappropriate and

There are more indirect ways to be involved with students that are as important, if not more important, than the window dressing of hanging around the student union, said the New York City na-

The president emphasized the importance to the university of establishing a positive rapport with the Las Vegas community.

"One of the indirect ways is to be certain that this community that supports this university financially, spiritually and philosophically, feels good about the new leadership of this institution," Harter said. "If it feels bad about

us and turns its back on us; that's going to have an immediate impact over time on every student here."

Harter praised the Las Vegas community for their past support to UNLV.

"This is a very generous com-munity," Harter said. "I think they are invested in this university and in its success in a very important way."

Accepting the role as UN-LV's first woman president poses some unique challeng-

es, Harter said.
"Every time you break a barrier where a woman or a black or a Hispanic person has not been before, you have to prove yourself in ways that can be very demanding," said Harter. She said she works 12-14 hour days, seven days a week to meet her challenges.

Harter said in addition to the challenges, she also faces some opposition.

"There are some good ol'boys who would prefer a woman not lead an institution with Division I-A sports," Harter said. "There are people who don't believe a woman is tough enough and strong enough to do that.'

Harter, who was also the first woman vice president for administration at Ohio University, said that through hard work she is confident in proving she possesses the presidential skills required to lead UNLV.

"If you have self confidence and if you work very hard. really work hard, and you don't let unfair opposition or some prejudices affect the way you behave, I think you can prove that you're competent," said Harter, who noted that only 8 percent of universities with Division I-A athletics are led by women.

Added Harter, "I don't spend a lot of time thinking about it. I just spend a lot of time working to be the best that I can


