"We teach the management aspects of the job, not how to be a waiter," Azizsoltani stressed. "To be a hotel or food and beverage manager, one must have certain skills."

While Azizsoltani is responsible for the font of the house operations, Chef Jean Hertzman handles the back. "The student managers have to come up with the recipe," the chef stated. "Then we bring it back to the kitchen to test it—see what adjustments need to be made. It is imperative to the learning experience."

Hotel major Todd Huggins feels the program is very good. "It teaches you everything," said the senior, who plans to go into private club management. "It's a valuable experience for anyone who wants to be part of any food and beverage situation." He had already served his time in the production end and was taking his turn with the front of the house duties.

James Korona, another senior in the program agreed with Huggins. "You look at things differently; the way things flow, in general, can be critical." He also indicated that it was a lot more work than he imagined. "There is more depth to the process, and I have more respect than I previously did." Korona also added that the key to success was marketing your product. "Even people in the hotel school don't know about this program."
