Fellowships for African American students

Applications are available to African American students for UNCF • Merck Science Fellowships, which will be awarded at the undergraduate, graduate and postdoctoral levels.

At the undergraduate level, 15 science research scholarships will be awarded to students who expect to graduate in 1997. Each award includes tuition of up to \$15,000, two Merck summer internship stipends totaling \$10,000, and an institutional grant of up to \$10,000.

At the graduate level, 12 science research dissertation fellowships will be awarded for a minimum of 12 months up to a maximum of 24 months of graduate study. Each fellowship includes a stipend of up to \$25,000 and an institutional grant of up to \$15,000.

Ten postdoctoral science research fellowships will be awarded, which also covers a minimum period of 12 months, up to a maximum of 24 months. Each fellowship includes a stipend of up to \$40,000 and an institutional grant of up to \$15,000.

The fellowships are part of a 10-year initiative administered by The College Fund/UNCF. Applications are available through the registrar's office. Application deadline is Feb. 26.

Fellowships worth up to \$24,000 are available for students who intend to become secondary school teachers of American history, American government, and

social studies

The James Madison Memorial Fellowship Foundation will award generous fellowships for this year for master's degree graduate study of the framing and history of the U.S. Constitution. Fellowships carry a maximum stipend of \$24,000 for up to two years of full-time study for college

Fellows may enroll in graduate programs in American history, political science, or education. Participation in an accredited four-week summer institute on the principles, framing, ratification and implementation of the Constitution and Bill of Rights is required of all fellows.

After completing study, James Madison Fellows are required to teach American history, government or social studies in grades 7-12 for a minimum of one year for each academic year of graduate assistance they receive.
