Fashion: Italians go back to the future

ROME (AP) - It's back to the future for fashion in 1996, with Italian designers taking a new look at the mod styles of the 1950s and 1960s for their spring-summer collections.

Sometimes feminine, often funky, the oldies but goodies will all return-shifts, shirtwaists, caftans, hip-huggers and hot pants.

These styles are updated mainly through technologically advanced fabrics-combinations of synthetics and silks, which create new textures.

The most futuristic is the super-stretch lurex in shimmering shades, which will positively blaze in the summer sun.

Just like in the heydays of Audrey Hepburn and Jacqueline Kennedy, Brigitte Bardot and Marilyn Monroe, Bob Dylan and the Beatles, the look is a combination of topdrawer chic and counter-culture cool.

Neat little suits with short belted jackets and proper midknee hemlines, country club shirt dresses and polo shirts will share the closet with bellbottoms and wide-lapeled pantsuits, cropped lurex Tshirts, caftans and pedal push-

Waistlines are either demurely cinched, dropped or bared to hug the hip and reveal the navel.

1996 marks the year of the bejeweled belly button, a fad started by Naomi Campbell during the spring-summer showings in Milan last October.

Small shoulder purses, thick-heeled pumps or posh suburban footwear-loafers and buckskins-and oversized plastic jewelry complete the vintage picture.

Hairdos range from the debutante page boy and ponytail to other-side-of-the-tracks

Speaking of debutantes, they will all be coming out again in 1996 in a series of dainty chiffon gowns and pretty floral printed petti-

coat dresses. For the more aggressive set, the Italian designers unleash a myriad of spotted and striped prints. This, too, is a revival item, as are the shocking lime pink and yellow shadescertainly not familiar in normally understated

Milan. The revival look when previewed in October was met

with mixed reviews. "Seeing it all over again re-

minded me of how awful the look was way back then," said Mary Lou Luther, a veteran U.S. fashion editor who writes a syndicated fashion column.

But the young set, which is now rediscovering the Beatles and lapping up such film favorites as "Breakfast at Tiffany's" and "Some Like It Hot" on TV, are sure to make the look their own.

Junior fashion followers have already shown their enthusiasm for past looks by snapping up all the thickheeled 1940s pumps launched this winter.

The bad news for this spring is that curves, bosoms and bottoms are out again to return to a Twiggy ironing board silhouette. So now that the Christmas season is over, a rigorous diet is a must.

On the good side, local thrift shops are sure to have a wide selection of vintage apparel at affordable prices.

How Italian designers interpret the spring look depends largely on their trademark styles.

It is easy for Valentino, the late Jacqueline Kennedy's favorite designer, to revive the His second-line Oliver collection features dainty prints, petticoat dresses and jumpsuits worn under short jackets

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Gucci, known for its classic styles, puts some new zing into a stuffy country club wardrobe. The horsy set will now sport seepolo through shirts, shirt dresses, rushes and lace for country club dinner dances.


Doing the 1960s for the first time are Milan's trendiest designers, Dolce and Gabbana, mere babes-in-arms when the Beatles first made music history.

Their strongest summer style is the pantsuit with low waisted bell-bottom pants and long, wide-lapeled doublebreasted jacket. Ultra short shiny vinyl skirts worn with lurex T-shirts are also typical 1960s fare.

Giorgio Armani shuns most of the mod fashions, sticking to his tailored suits in understated shades. Nighttime, however, is a modern debutante's dream of diaphanous pastel-colored chiffon ball gowns.

Gianni Versace offers the most modern version of the revival look. He does it with 1990s flair, which means gold buttons, fitted bodices and seethrough skirts. Versace's favorite shock color is lime green. But the new Versace suit with short jacket and just-abovethe-knee hemline comes in sedate navy blue or demure apricot.

The most low-key and lowwaisted collection of the season is Prada. Full of polo shirts, shifts and shirt dresses, the styles are drab, as are the anything-but-spring-like colors: chestnut brown, grape purple



Waiting To Exhale, by Teny McMillan. (Pocket \$6.99.) Four black women waiting for love that is so hard to find.

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
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
