proven you can. In most of my classes I sit on one side of the room and the guys sit on the other. It's hard because they have their own little study groups and hang out on Friday nights and (women) aren't a part of that. It makes me work harder to prove that I'm as good as they are."

"In my classes there are two or three women and thirty men," said Melissa Knox, a senior with a dual major in electrical engineering and physics.

"I would estimate that women represent 10 percent of the electrical and computer departments, 20 percent in mechanical and almost one-third of the civil engineering program," said Herbert Wells, a civil engineering lecturer. "I actively recruit women in the civil engineering program. That's probably why our numbers are a little higher."

Three other clubs on cam-

pus represent minorities in engineering: the Society of Hispanic Professional Engineers, the National Society of Black Engineers and the American Indian Sciences Society.

"I would encourage students with an interest in sciences and mathematics and a curiosity toward how things work to look into the opportunities in engineering and computer science," McGaugh said.

supporter of education," Titus said. If elected, Titus believes Coffin will serve UNLV's needs better than Ensign, because "Bob will be more sympathetic toward education issues—the cuts to student loans and other programs that place education at a higher level" of importance on the agenda.

Titus, who was the last politician to speak, introduced her-"friend, supporter, confidant, and my next U.S. Congressman, Bob Coffin" to the audience, and Coffin received a standing ovation.

University Regent Shelley Berkeley sat in the audience and smiled throughout her former classmate's speech. Berkeley and Coffin are both alumni of UNLV.

Berkeley said she supports Coffin because she is "comfortable with his political philosophies. Of the two candidates, he best exemplifies the role an elected official should play. "Bob will be an outstanding representative for students in Congress. He's sensitve to issues concerning students, issue of primary importance. Of the two candidates he understands what it's like to be from a middle class family and dependent on government loans and grants to get a quality education.

"As a member of Congress, you have to be the eyes, ears and voices of your constituents. I know he's respnsible to people he represents. That's the key to being a good Congressman.

Hausch, who is taking an active role in Coffin's campaign, said her dual role as a UNLV professor and the wife of a Senator hasn't posed an ethical voting conflict for Coffin yet, and she doesn't anticipate it causing a problem should he be elected as Congressman for the 1st Congressional District.

"Bob always does what's right," Hausch said. "My alignment with something doesn't influence the way he votes.
