Paul Slovic, professor of psychology at the University of Oregon, will deliver the next lecture in the ongoing series, "Nevada in the

Slovic will lecture on "Perceptions of Risk and Technological Stigma," discussing the role of individual perception in the creation of social values and social fear. He is the author or co-author of numerous studies of risk perception and social value.

plications for the vacancies. The deadline for completing a nomination form and returning it to the faculty senate office is March 15. Following is a list of vacancies:

- Senator—one vacancy for a three-year term. Applicants must be available for meetings from 12:15-2 p.m. Tuesdays.

- Curriculum committee—one vacancy for a two-year term.

- Grievance committee—seeking three nominees to a two-year term. Membership to be determined by a vote of the faculty senate.

- Professional staff—two year terms are vacant in the following areas: athletics and Thomas & Mack, two vacancies; finance and administration, one vacancy; president, one vacancy; provost, one vacancy; student services, one vacancy.

These workshops will help students decipher those cryptic messages instructors write in the margins of their papers. Find out what CS, RO, FS and FRAG means, and how to address those problems in essays. Included will be discussions on punctuation and grammar.
