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Interim provost honored

Ron Smith, UNLV Graduate College dean, was honored Tuesday for his oneand-a-half-years of service as Interim Provost.

The reception was held in Marietta Tiberti Grand Hall at the Richard Tam Alumni Center.

"I enjoyed the time I spent as provost, but my real love is the graduate school, and I'm looking forward to returning there," said Smith.

Smith seems to have good reason to be excited. Graduate college enrollment figures indicate a 12 percent increase for the 1995-96 school year.

"I love being the graduate dean," says Smith, who held the position for eight years prior to becoming the interim provost in 1994. "I have had to put some of the ideas for the college on hold, but now that I am returning, I can begin them."

Smith said his focus in the graduate college is on increasing financial assistance for graduate students through more grants and

scholarships. He added the construction of a new graduate teaching development center is also of primary concern. "I would like to have these programs implemented within the next three years," Smith said.

As interim provost, Smith's responsibilities included handling budget problems, deciding which courses are transferable from other colleges, and personnel decisions such as tenure and salaries

A permanent provost was recently selected. Douglas Ferraro, former dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at the University of Western Michigan, will begin his duties Friday.

Board of Regents to award \$5,000

The UNLV recipient of a \$5,000 award from a Board of Regents committee will be announced Friday, said Mary Lou Moser, secretary of the University and Community College System of Nevada.

Nevada Regents' Researcher and Creative Activity Award recommendations will be approved at the Board of Regents meeting at 9 a.m. at the Commnunity College of Southern Nevada, Cheyenne campus.

The two awards are being given by the Academic, Research, and Student Affairs' Committee.

Also on the agenda are UNLV student fee changes for fiscal year 1997. Among the requested changes are a \$50 increase in resident tuition, a \$200 increase in out-of-state tuition and a \$58 increase in optional student health insurance. A proposal to increase fees for UNLV student teaching and internships over a three-year period will be heard. The first increase of \$75 per course will be implemented in the fall.

Individuals nominated to receive awards for 1996 Outstanding Students and 1997 Honorary Doctorate Degrees will be determined and President Carol Harter will recommend UNLV candidates for tenure. Appointment approvals will be sought for Marga-
