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# Bayno gets five-year contract extension

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Rebels' head coach receives a \$20,000 per year raise

UNLV Runnin' Rebel Head Coach Bill Bayno will receive a five-year contract, pending approval by the Board of Regents.

The UNLV Athletic Department on Friday announced the recommendation for the new deal, which will include a base salary of \$130,000 and additional incentives.

The contract was recommended by UNLV President Carol Harter, who is placing the item on the agenda for the approval by the Board of Regents. The regents will meet on Friday in Las Vegas.

"The people and the community of Las Vegas have been great to me," Bayno said. "I love it here in Las Vegas and I'm extremely happy about the contract.

"I have always said that being the head coach at UNLV is an enormous opportunity to run one of the top programs in the history of college basketball," he added.

In June 1996, Bayno was given



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a four-year contract with a base salary of \$110,000—a deal that the Board of Regents approved unanimously. In 1995, he originally inked a four-year deal worth \$100,000 per year.

"It's a critical element of the program," UNLV Athletic Director Charles Cavagnaro said of Bayno's leadership. "His spirit and enthusiasm is contagious, not just for the basketball program, but for this university and this city."

The contract could be worth up

to \$450,000 including outside money generated by the basketball program. Bayno is set to earn \$125,000 per year from television and radio commitments, and \$100,000 annually from a Nike apparel contract.

The remaining amount would come from posrt-season incentives and a percentage of the average paid attendance at the Thomas & Mack Center.

In his second year as head coach, Bayno guided the UNLV basketball team to a 22-10 record, an improvement over last year's 10-16 season. UNLV advanced to the quarterfinals of the National Invitational Tournament and its 22 wins was the most since the 1991-92 season (26-2).

In the classroom, the Runnin' Rebels posted a 2.88 GPA for the 1996 fall semester, which is believed to be the best ever for the program.

"The length of the contract was the important thing," Bayno said in the April 19 issue of the Las Vegas Review-Journal. "Taking care of my assistant coaches was important." According to Bayno, keeping the staff intact was important for ensuring the Rebels remain a recruiting force.

Assistants Greg Vetrone, Glynn Cyprien, Dave Rice and Barry Rohrssen did not receive any base salary increase apart from the three percent increase given to all full time UNLV employees. However, they receive as home attendance bonus

Vetrone was responsible for recruiting 6-foot-9 swing man Lamar Odom as well as 6-8 forward Kaspars Kambala. Cyprien landed Edwin "Greedy" Daniels, one of the country's most coveted point guards, and 6-10 shot blocking specialist Javares Anderson out of Gulf Coast Community College in Panama City, Fla.

Bayno said he was also concerned over the recruiting budget, which was \$75,000 last year. UNLV's staff still overspent its recruiting budget, despite the lack of frivolous travel outlays.

"The insulation is peeling off and it is falling to the floor in


some places," he said.

# Revisions to refund policy proposed

The Board of Regents will vote to revise the campus refund policy this week at its meeting to be held at the Desert Research Institute, Las Vegas.

Both Nevada and non-residential students will be entitled to a 100 percent refund within the first week of instruction and a 50 percent refund within the second week.

Both classifications of students could withdrawal from the university with a full refund and would be entitled to half the amount from the last day of late registration until the end of the sixth week of instruction.

No refunds would be available beyond that point.

While UNLV is only looking to revise its refund policy, other in-

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
