Rebel softball struggling after great start

The Rebel softball team has run into a bit of trouble lately, but has still posted a respectable record of 15-18 overall and sits in third place in the Western Athletic Conference with a record of 9-7.

The Rebels entered the month of April with a mark of 13-13 and then proceded to sweep a doubleheader from San Jose St., right here at Rebel Diamond, 5-4 in the first game, and 6-5 in the second. The game took place on April 3.

Since then, the Rebels have struggled, although it has been against tough competition. The next day brought another home doubleheader, this one against Fresno State, the third-ranked team in the country.

The Rebels were swept by the mighty Bulldogs, going

15-13 in the nightcap. It was a difficult loss, but was expected against the highly-ranked Bulldogs.

The treacherous schedule continued as the Rebels then went on the road to face 18thranked Long Beach State on April 7. The game went 18 innings before Long Beach was able to score the winning run off Brandi Isgar in a 2-1 marathon affair.

Isgar pitched all 17.2 innings and did a tremendous job holding the potent 49er offense, but the offense just couldn't get to the Long Beach pitching.

"We outplayed them, out hit them, we just left too many runners on base," Coach Shan McDonald said. "We played hard the whole way, you just never know who's going to win. It was very disappointing."

The scoring drought contin-

down 9-3 in the first game, and ued the next day as the Rebels .351 with seven home runs and were swept in a double-header by a strong Cal-State Fullerton team, 1-0 and 3-0.

> The five game losing streak came against three very tough opponents and included several heartbreaking losses.

> The Rebels now gear up for a four game road trip featuring doubleheaders at Utah on Friday and Colorado St. on Saturday.

> Including those games, the Rebels have 18 games remaining this season and they hope they can squeeze as many wins as possible out of these games.

"We've hit well, played good defense and our pitching has been fine. We just can't seem to get the key hit," McDonald said.

Several Rebel performers have had good seasons at the plate, however. Leading the way is All-America Candidate Julie Crandall. She is hitting

22 RBI. In conference games, she is hitting .378 with four home runs.

Raven Coberg has hit 4 home runs and knocked in 18, while hitting .287. She has stepped up her offense in conference games, leading the team with a .392 average and 16 RBI.

Keao Chang has also hit well this year, compiling a .316 average with a home run and nine batted in. She also recorded the team's only triple.

All together, the Rebels are near the bottom of the WAC, hitting .247 as a team. Crandall is second in the conference with seven home runs. She has also racked up 20 walks and an onbase percentage of .469, both ranking her third in the conference.

Chang's on-base percentage of .446 ranks her sixth. Coberg sits in fifth with five home runs and is tenth in conference batting average, hitting at a .392 clip.

The defensive side has been

the strength of the Rebel team. The .957 fielding percentage of the Rebel defense ranks second in the WAC. The team ERA of 2.21 is good for fourth in the conference.

Brandi Isgar is near the top of many individual pitching categories as well. She leads the conference in innings pitched with 144. She is third in the conference in strikeouts with 88 and eighth in ERA with 1.75.

With all these great individual performances, the Rebels seem like they should have a better record. However, the clutch hitting just hasn't been there

"The team has played with a lot of enthusiasm, focus, and intensity. I just hope it pays off soon," McDonald said. "We have done everything well enough, we just need to push runs across in key situations."

The next Rebel home game will be a Tuesday doubleheader against the San Diego St. Aztecs, a conference foe at Rebel Diamond at noon.

Rebel golfers win school record sixth tournament

The other top collegiate golf teams have seen enough.

It's the same old story.

See the UNLV golf team win a tournament ... see the Rebels win other event ... see the Rebels kept the first-place ranking in every major poll.

Keeping with tradition, the No. 1 ranked UNLV golf team held off a fierce third-round rally by Wake Forest to capture the team title at the BELLSOUTH Yellow Pages Intercollegiate at the par-72, 6,829 MacGregor Downs Country Club this past weekend.

After leading the tournament by nine strokes after two rounds of play, UNLV (287-283-298 - 868, four over par) shot a final round 298, holding on for a one stroke victory of Wake Forest.

"I think we got off to a fast start pable.

and played well on the 36-hole day," UNLV golf coach Dwaine Knight said. "That set up the victory for us."

The win extended the Rebels' best ever season victory total to six and marked UNLV's 10th top-five finish in 12 events this season.

Winning a golf tournament is no easy task.

"It's pretty hard," Knight said. "There is so much parity in college golf. For us to have accomplished what we have, it says a lot about our kids."

Wake Forest (296-286-287) posted a third-round low total of 287 to make things interesting. North Carolina finished third with a score of 875, Duke came in fourth at 879 and Clemson was fifth with a three-day total of 880.

Individually, UNLV sophomore Jeremy Anderson was unstop-

Anderson made a little history in taking home medalist honors with a six-under par, 210 performance. He became the first Rebel to win two events this season since Chris Riley (3) and Ed Fryatt (2) accomplished the feat during the 1993-94 season.

Anderson, who shot a finalround 71 to secure the win, captured the GolfWorld Invitational back in November for his earlier win.

"He (Anderson) just felt really comfortable on the golf course,' Knight said. "His (first round) 67 set the tone for the tournament."

UNLV had two other players finish in the top team of the leaderboard.

Junior Charley Hoffman finished in a fifth-place tie with a 72-68-76-216 and senior Bill Lunde
