President Harter recently appointed a 13-member task force to take on diversity issues. The task of an "inclusive and just campus community," according to the newsletter published by the Diversity Initiatives

The primary mission of the task force is to assess UNLV with regard to the goal of inclusion, justice and civility. It will also make suggestions for a process for "campus constituencies to engage in meaningful discussions and educational programs about justice and civility" and define assessment methods to measure the progress, the newsletter stated.

Paul Meacham will chair the task force. Harter appointed the following official members of the UNLV faculty, staff and student body to serve on the task force: Tony Miranda, anthropology; Cynthia Carruthers, leisure studies; Sam Papalii, football; John Swetnam, anthropology; Phil Burns, Campus Community Development; Bill Sullivan, Academic Advancement; Willard Rollins, history; John Schibrowsky, marketing; Patricia Zozaya, admissions; Mateo Nares, student; Amanda Owens, human resources; and Myoung-ja Kwon, li-

Harter also appointed members who will sit in on discussions but will

not vote. The members include the following: Ann Casados-Mueller, diversity initiatives; Velicia McMillan, multicultural student affairs; Harriet Barlow, graduate college; Juanita Fain, enrollment management; and Rebecca Mills, office of the President.

The Diversity Initiatives Office recently added a new subject matter to their employee diversity training curriculum, "Valuing, Respecting and Understanding Diversity." A companion the training is sexual harassment prevention, required for supervisors and managers. Although the first curriculum is new, the sexual harassment prevention courses have been conducted on campus since last sum-

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
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
