COLD ATOMS TO BE LECTURE TOPIC

The Spring 1998 UNLV University Forum lecture series concludes this month with a presentation on developments in cold atom technology.

On April 27, "What's Hot with Cold Atoms" will be the UNLV physics professor Bernard Zygelman's topic of discussion as he reviews recent progress on efforts to produce ultra-cold atoms in the laboratory.

In a presentation geared to the layperson, Zygelman will demonstrate how current developments may play a role in spawning novel technology, such as the matter laser and quantum computers.


UNLV ethics and policy studies director Craig Walton will serve as moderator. In the last half hour of the event, the panel members will field questions from the audience based on the issues being discussed.
