Chambers resigns from post at U

The plot is thickening in the never ending soap opera of UNLV

Amid yet another controversy in the UNLV athletic department, associate director David Chambers resigned on Tuesday to pursue career options elsewhere.

Despite several media reports and rampant speculation that focus on UNLV athletic director Charles Cavagnaro using racial sturs in describing African American athletes and members of the softball team, Chambers claims that had nothing to do with his decision.

Recently, questions are flooding the athletic department about the hiring of Regina Miller as the new women's basketball coach, Miller, who is African American, compiled a dismal 60-100 record at Western Illinois before coming to UNLV less than a month ago.

Several supporters of the Lady Rebel basketball program have shown their disapproval of the hiring and media reports linking the decision to Cavagnaro and his ongoing effort to avoid any problems over his alleged comments.

Adding to the saga is Rudy Washington, head of the Black Coaches' Association.

A published report last week

showed that Washington was hired by the university as a consultant back in February. It is believed that Washington highly influenced the decision to hire

According to information from

the Las Vegas Sun, the contract was dated Feb. 12, 10 days after former head coach LaDonna McClain was fired. Washington was paid \$550 for his services on Feb. 12-16 and \$224.08 for his traveling expenses.

In the Sun's

Cavagnaro denied the rumors that Washington was involved in the search process.

"He was brought here to help with our diversity plan with the NCAA," Cavagnaro claimed in the April 22 edition of the Sun.

"We hadn't even formed our search committee yet when he met us."

Miller listed Washington as a reference on her resume and the Sun further reported that Washington was seen on campus at least on two more separate occa-

"Let me reiterate that there were no undue outside pressures whatsoever from anyone to hire Regina Miller," Cavagnaro said. "I'm as comfortable and confident about the hiring of Regina Miller today as I was two weeks ago.'

Cavagnaro's next defense will be responding to the rumors of his continued use of racial slurs in depicting UNLV athletes.

A local television station aired an interview late last week with a former athletic department employee who confirmed that he has heard Cavagnaro use racial remarks on more than one occa-

Cavagnaro reportedly called black atheletes "monkeys" and said they "should go back to the jungle.'

Cavagnaro has yet to comment on this to any media.

Now that Chambers has stepped down, questions and concerns again revolve around the athletic department.
