Editorial

Community Seder???

Unless at least 150 persons respond practically immediately, there probably will not be a community Passover Seder this year at Temple Beth Shalom.

For the benefit of our Gentile readers, Seders are the ceremonial evening meals served the first and second nights of the Passover festival, with various special dishes symbolizing the hardships the Israelites went through during their bondage in Egypt. The narrative of the Exodus is recited and gratitude is spoken for the deliverance. Questions are asked by the children and answered by the head of the household.

Passover is one of the most important and elaborate of the Jewish festivals. The celebration begins on the 14th day of the first month of the Jewish calendar, Nisan, which falls this year on April 16th. It lasts seven days. The Christian feast of Easter is calculated from the Pasch or Passover, according to Gaster's "Passover: Its History and Traditions," published in 1949.

Here in Las Vegas, when the Jewish community was in its infancy, a group of the more sturdy members com-

Jewish War Veterans National Commander Ralph Plofsky will be a guest speaker at Temple Beth Shalom tonight, during Friday evening Services.

Plofsky, who will pay tribute to Charles Kandell of the Sands for promoting the scholarship fund of Las Vegas Post 711, will report on his recent tour of Israel.

It was Plofsky, as spokesman for JWV, who was responsible for the following deeds during recent weeks: 1) a strong letter urging West Germany to resist and ignore Nasser's blackmail threats which stopped the shipment of arms to Israel and termed it an "act of betrayal against people to whom it owes a monumental moral debt"; 2) request of Attorney General Katzenbach for more effective laws to prevent disturbances and abuses of the dignity of Congress by members of the American Nazi Party; 3) commendation of House members who voted for cutting off surplus commodity aid to Egypt's Nasser regime.

Judge David Zenoff is a man of many roles and many purposes in life -- all of them an asset to humanity and a credit to our community.

He's an able jurist in the highest court of Clark County. He's achieved a tremen-

dous background of service in the interests of children and prevention and cure of juvenile delinquency. He's an ardent sportsman, well versed in rules and regulations for proper conduct of competitive events. He is a

good Jew, who has never strayed from his responsibilities towards our Faith.

District Court Judge Zenoff, whose jurisdiction extends from murder to petty offenses and from the most complicated civil trials to divorce, is a firm but fair man in his robe of jurisprudence. He is known as a man who stands for no nonsense, but his judgement is tempered with mercy.

A large portion of Judge Zenoff's official duties, since he was appointed by Gov. Russell in Dec. 1958, has been with juvenile problems. He has become so immersed in youngsters in trouble, that a great deal of his own time is devoted to the rehabilitation of our future citizens. BONN BACK IN PROMISED LAND

BONN, (JTA) -- Chancellor Ludwig Erhard, in an official statement announced that the West German Government is ready to establish diplomatic relations with Israel and to compensate Israel for the rest of the promised arms aid which was cut off after a protest from Egypt. The statement also said that the Bonn Government will stop all economic aid and further credits to Egypt.

The statement emphasized that the West German Government rejects any kind of intervention in her affairs.
