Rabbi Gold has been asked to speak to various Christian groups recently in addition to several T.V. programs sponsored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews. He has addressed this student body of Las Vegas High School. The young people were so moved by the Jewish concept of Brother-hood that a group of them followed Rabbi Gold's address with a visit to the Temple.
