KUSEVITSKY SCORES A GREAT TRIUMPH IN LV

The beautiful sanctuary of Temple Beth Sholom, was filled to overflowing into the social hall. There was a hum and a buzz of expectancy, from those who had purchased tickets in advance, and

for those who decided to take a chance at the door at the last minute. They were waiting with a little trepidation, a lot of skepticism, and the knowledge that this was another first for Las Vegas, in which they were participating.

ISRAEL READY IF WAR COMES

TEL AVIV, (JTA) ---- Israel's chief of staff of its defense forces, General Yitzhak Rabin, warned that, if ordered to do so, Israel's army could effectively prevent the Arabs from carrying out their intentions to divert the headwaters of the Jordan River. He reiterated also previous warnings to the effect that Israel will hold Arab countries responsible if their people should try infiltration or sabotage against Israel's National Water Carrier.

Addressing the biannual convention of the Tel Aviv Journalists Association, the general spoke of Israel's need to strengthen its army as a deterrent factor. "But if the Arabs continue with their aggressive acts against Israel, whether against Israel's waters or against our borders," he stated, "this deterrent force could be utilized as a decisive factor."

Up to now, he said, Syria has begun to carry out only preliminary work toward the diversion of the Jordan River headwaters, in accordance with the decision of the Arab states. Neither Lebanon nor Jordan, he declared, has done anything as yet along this line. For the time being, he reported, Syria has begun to level and open water routes for a distance of about three and a half miles from the Banias river.

"If and when," he continued, "the canals are built, they will be close to Israel's border. The Banias springs are within one mile of the Israel border, and the Wazani springs are within two and a half miles of our border. In view of Israel's latest performance, there is no doubt that, if and when action is called for, it would not be among the toughest tasks for our army to stop the Arabs from carrying out their plans."

Ruth Speiser took her place on the pulpit alongside Rabbi Gold and Cantor Kohn. The orchestra took its place. The lights were dimmed and the first introduction announced Morry King and his group would render some well known music. Then - with a grand fanfare it started.

The walls of the Temple resounded with the music from the overture, breaking the ice for those in the audience. Now came the time for Cantor Joseph Kohn to introduce the star, Cantor David Kusevitsky, and Rabbi Aaron Gole, who would in turn explain the numbers to be rendered by the famed Tenor.

A medium height, dark haired, (to the average eye) ordinary man took his place before the microphone on the Bemah. The first notes of "Exrih" stole through the hall. The audience was lost in rapture to a voice that rose and fell in liquid tones, that swelled from the depths to the heights with a smoothness, a liquidness, and a quality that brought on a feeling of well begin. MEET KITTIE WIENER

If you ever decide that it would be a good idea to interview one of the Matriachs of the Jewish community of Las Vegas, here is the very thing that you don't do: You don't go armed with a pad and pencil, and sit down with the thought that it will go in a routine way. It didn't when we got the Kittie Wiener story. Here's why.
You start - where were you born? Answer: Pittsburgh, Penn. You then ask, When?

Answer: July 16th, 1891.

Question: what was the name of your parents? Answer: Sally and Issac Diamondstone. Question: How many brothers and sisters? Answer: four sisters, (three now surviving) and three brothers - and then you throw away the pad, and sit and talk, and reminisce.

It appears she went to school until she was about 14 years of age, stayed for one half day in high school, then decided that she preferred to study voice and piano under a well known teacher in her home town, a Mr. Lewison. This suited her tastes more, for she had been a student from the age of six, and it consumed much of her time. Thus it was her main occupation, until 1908 when she met Louis Wiener, who was to become her husband in 1911.

Their life was pleasant and pretty much routine until they moved to Las Vegas in 1931. Things took a new turn. They started a custom tailoring business on Fremont street. For one year they were located where the Horseshoe now stands and (Continued on page 3)

SNEAK ATTACK KILLS FARMER

JERUSALEM, (JTA) Syrian gun posts across Israel's northern frontier, near the Sea of Galilee, attacked Israeli field workers in the fields near the settlement of Korazim three times, killing one Israeli and damaging a tractor. Israel returned the fire each time.

The attacks were mounted only 24 hours after United Nations military observers had ruled that the Israeli farmers at work in the fields near Korazim were on Israeli territory, and not, as Syrians contended, in the demilitarized zone between the two countries.

Syria used recoilless guns, 120-millimeter mortars and machine guns in their attacks, while Israel replied with mortar fire and tank-mounted guns. The victim was fatally wounded in the first of the three attacks.

U.N. military observers arranged a cease-fire after the second of the attacks, but the Syrians violated that arrangement until Israel's guns silenced the Syrian positions. Except for the one Israeli farmer, there were no other casualties on the Israeli side. When the shooting was over, the farmers outside Korazim returned to their work in the fields.

Those who attend will not only vote in the general election of officers for the ensuing year, but they also will hear an exceptional speaker tell them how to make a million dollars.

Caution and careful consideration should be exercised in selecting those who will guide the destinies of the group in 1965, because it is these leaders who will be responsible for the raising and spending of \$60,000 necessary for six new Hebrew and Sunday school classrooms, in addition to the general function of raising moneys for the Temple.

A most impressive slate of outstanding members of the Jewish community, prepared by the nominating committee will be submitted for consideration. But you have to be there to vote.
