NEW YORK, (JTA) -- The Jewish community in Riga has started baking matzoh in an oven in the courtyard of the synagogue there, it was reported here but the quantities being baked are sev-ere limited because of technical problems and a long delay in getting permission from the authorities.

Local officials repeatedly refused permission which was finally granted after in-tervention from Moscow. The delay means that many Riga Jews will not have matzoh. Matzoh baking in Odes-sa started Purim eve after repeated refusals in that city

NEW YORK, (JTA) - Fresh expressions of Jewish support for the Negro battle for voting rights, much of it geared to the historic Freedom March in Alabama, was recorded from many communities.

A delegation of Massachusetts rabbis, led by Rabbi H. Bruce Ehrmann, flew to Alabama to join the march. Orin Lehman, secretary of the American Jewish Committee, headed a delegation of the agency's members and staff which went to Montgomery. They took part in the final leg of the march to Montgomery, the state capital. Mr. Lehman is a nephew of the late New York Governor and Senator Herbert Lehman, whose family originally settled in Montgomery. Nearly 100 officers and members of the American Jewish Congress from all sections of the country responded to a call from Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., to join the Freedom March.

The Union of Orthodox Congregations of Jewish America announced creation of a special committee on human rights with the immediate aim of aiding Negroes in all parts of the country. In announcing the special committee, president Moses Feurstein said three members went to Alabama (Continued on Page 2)
