JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

NEW YORK (WNS) -- One of the largest gatherings in the history of the New York Jewish Community took place here last Thursday evening when thousands of people jammed Madison Square Garden in a demonstration of protest against Soviet suppression of the cultural and religious freedom of its 3,000,000 Jewish citizens.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (WNS) -- A Soviet bid to have a synagogue adjacent to the United Nations building remove a plaque against anti-Semitism in the Soviet Union was rebuffed this week when the U.S. advised the Soviet Mission to the United Nations that the plaque did not violate any of the rights of the Soviet mission.

BUENOS AIRES (WNS) -- Some twenty-thousand spectators attending a rally here in observance of the anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising, heard one of the outstanding figures in Argentine Jewish life bluntly warn the anti-Semites of the country that "the Jewish people have learned the lesson of the Warsaw Ghetto" and "we shall not be eternal candidates for assassination."

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Senator Robert F. Kennedy, New York Democrat, has appealed to the Federal Republic of Germany to do what is just and right and fair to indemnify the survivors of Nazi persecution.

SAN FRANCISCO (WNS) -- The official organ of the San Francisco Roman Catholic Archdiocese, The Monitor, in its most recent issue carried an editorial whose major thesis is that "the Jews as a people are in no way responsible for the killing of Christ."

BRUSSELS (WNS) -- The Spanish Government will soon give legal recognition to the Madrid Jewish community, it was predicted here at the meeting of the Standing Conference of European Jewish Community Services.

STRASBOURG (WNS) -- The Consultative Assembly of the 18-nation Council of Europe this week approved a resolution urging Soviet authorities to grant freedom of worship and travel to its estimated 3,000,000 Jewish nationals.

In addition, the resolution called for an end to the discriminatory prosecution of Soviet Jews for "economic" crimes.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- A program of unified action, placing chief emphasis on the need of ensuring the future of the American Jewish community, was adopted at a conference of the American Zionist Council, coordinating body of all Zionist groups in the country.

PARIS (WNS) -- India's former Minister of Defense Krishna Menon was reported last week by an influential Cairo newspaper to have cautioned the Arabs not to talk about throwing Israel into the seas "because by that you would pollute the water."

LONDON (WNS) -- A resolution calling on the British Government to "make appropriate representations" to the government of the Soviet Union with respect to its denial of equal religious, cultural and certain civic right to Jews was adopted here at a meeting of al major Jewish organizations in this country. The meeting was convened by the Board of Deputies of British Jews.

BONN (WNS) -- Cairo reports reaching here indicate that 80 German scientists working in Egypt on advanced weapons had returned to Germany in the past five months and that many who are scheduled for summer vacations had indicated they would not return.

GENEVA (WNS) -- The Memorial Foundation for Jewish Culture will operate in three principal areas--education, research in the history of European Jewish communities and commemoration and documentation of the Nazi holocaust--it was announced here fol owing disclosure that the organization had al ocated \$900,000 for those objectives.
