(Continued from Page 1) It was the Monsarrat Grade School band with Morris conducting. There was no money for music stands, so each of the children in front had the music pinned to the backs of their shirts.

The family returned to Louisville and another grocery store in the Negro community, but Morris continued with his music. His practicing was heard at all hours of the day and night. The Morris became "Moishe." At the age of 12, he was a member of a string quartet that played for the opening of RadioStation WHAS, now one of the largest television operations in Kentucky. On the anniv-ersary of its inception, the station runs a special program depicting the life of one of the original stars who appeared at the opening. Morris, Moishe, and now Morry, was so honored. He looks forward to 1972 when al! those who performed at the opening wil, if still alive, be invited to the 50th anniversary celebration.

At a very young age, Morris came to the attention of a philanthropist, Morris Simon, who was known as the "Father of the Young Men's Hebrew Association." Simon brought Morris to the Robert Parmenter orchestra, where the youngster stayed on for 12 years. It was a world of experience for Morris.

Then the years began to roll by with one sophisticated engagement fol owing another. Hollywood's Cocoanut Grove followed by New York at the Ambassador Hotel, the Waldorf Astoria and the Rainbow Room atop the Rockefeller Center. By this time Morry had mastered the rhumba and tango popular dances of the day. It was a long way from the \$2 per night engagement at the River Valley Country Club years previous.

In 1940, prior to entering the Marine Corp. for World War II, Morry adopted the last name of King, for marquee purposes. In the Armed Services, he organized and played with a band to entertain the troops.

Morry, from an Orthodox family, never forgot his religion. He became dedicated to his Faith at an early age. He remembers missing only one Kaddish (prayer for the dead) in behalf of his father during eleven months. Morry was but seven and a half at the time and the solemn morning and evening prayer necessitated getting up at 3:30 a.m. and traveling through blinding snowstorms and intense heat.

During the war, Morry's band played the first Seder (Passover festival) on Guam and Iwo Jima. More than 3,-000 servicemen attended. On Memorial Day in 1942, Morry and one other Jew, were members of the Marine band

that played the Services in Arlington Cemetery. By coincidence, the other chap's name was also Perlmutter, who today is known as Jan Pierce.

Twenty three years ago in Atlantic City, Morry became acquainted with a lovely Miss in Atlantic City. Today, Estelle is Mrs. Morry King, mother of their two fine sone, Michael and Barry.
