# JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

WASHINGTON (WNS) Legislation denouncing the Arab boycott of Israel and calling on American businessmen not to participate in it was adopted by the House of Representative by a vote of 387 to 1 by way of an amemdment of the Export Control Act,

ROME (WNS) The Ecumenical Council at it's forthcoming session will "confirm the declaration repudiating the charge of decide against the Jewish people, "according to press reports of a statement attributed to Father Schmidt, secretary to Augustin Cardinal Bea.

LONDON (WNS) The Soviet news agency Tass has reported that six people convicted of mas murders in Nazi camps had been given the death penalty but while indicating that the crimes were committed in areas where thousands of Jews perished the agency failed to mention the fact that the victims were Jews or mostly Jews.

LONDON (WNS) The American film "John Goldfarb, Please Come Home" has been blacklisted by the Jordanian Government on the ground that it is a pro-Zionist production, according to a report from Amman.

NEW YORK (WNS) Because of continued massive migration of Jews there will be need for large scale programs of vocational aid in the coming years, according to a report appearing in the ORT Yearbook 1965.

CINCINNATI (WNS) The Central Conference of American Rabbis opened its 76th annual meeting here amidst indication of growing concern in the Reform movement about the place of the Sabbath in Reform Jewish life.

Following discussion of the problem, to be guided by Rabbi W. Gunther Plaut of Holy Blossom Temple, Toronto, the participants were expected to formulate new methods of approaching the Sabbath and present them for consideration by the delegates.

THE HAGUE (WNS) An appeal for a new trial for Dr. Frederick Weinreb, former Dutch Jewish community leader who was given a six-year term in 1948 following conviction on charges of having collaborated with the Nazis during their occupation of Holland, was filed with the Ministry of Justice in a petition signed by hundreds of Jews in this country.

CINCINNATI (WNS) Establishment by the Hebrew Union College-Jesish Institute of Religion of a new chair in honor of its president, Dr. Nelson Glueck, was announced at a meeting of the institution's board of governors.

NEW YORK (WNS) Israel must face the challenge of automation if it is to compete in world markets with the advanced countries of the free world, it was declared here by Aryeh Manor, vice president of the Bann Leumi le-Israel and former economic Minister at the Israel Embassy in Washington.

ALBANY (WNS) Opposition to a Group Libel Bill was transmitted this week to Governor Rockefeller by the New York Chapter of the American Jewish Committee.

The bill, now waiting for the Governor's signature to become a law , creates for the first time in New York a criminal penalty for group libel. The bill defines group libel as the uttering or publishing of any statement or statements defamatory a racial or religious group that are known to the utterer or publisher to be false.

CHICAGO (WNS) Rabbi Seymour J. Cohen of Anshe Emet Synagogue, has been elected President of the Snynagouge Council of America as successor to Rabbi Uri Miller. who served as president for two one-year terms.

TRONTO (WNS) Jewish participants in a riot at a recent neo-Nazi rally here were admonished by the Canadian Jewish Congress for "irresponsible creating a tense and inflamed situation."

TEL AVIV (WNS) Sudden cancellation by Delhi of a wrestling match here between an Indian and Israeli team was seen as another indication of Delhi's unfriendliness to Israel,

NEW YORK (WNS) The Jewish Agency for Israel, Inc. allocated \$37 million to carry out urgent humanitarian programs among Israel's large immigrant population. The action was taken by the Agency's board of directors at a sepecial meeting.

WASHINGTON (WAS) N. Welch, an FBI agent, declared that there is close cooperation between the anti-Semitic American Nazi Party and the KKK.

NEW YORK (WNS) More than 1,000 delegates are expected to converge here the weekend of July 1-4 for the 68th annual convention of the Zionist Organization of America. A highlight of the convention will be voting for the first time in a quarter of a century on basic revisions of the ZOA constitution.

## TOP JEWISH PHILOSOPHER DEAD

JERUSALEM (SNS)--Professor Martin Buber, deemed the foremost Jewish thinker of the age and a philosopher of world-wide impact, died here at his home at the age of 87.

Dr. Buber served as professor at the Hebrew University since his coming to Palestine in 1938, After retiring from teaching in 1951, he held the title of professor emeritus of philosophy at the university.

As a student, Dr. Buber became interested in Zionism, becoming later the editor of Die Welt, Viennese Zionist newspaper. Later he became the founder of the Jewish Publishing House in Vienna, the Judishcer Varlag and from 1916 to 1924 he edited Der Jude, leading organ of German Jews.

Following expulsion from Germany after the rise of nazism, he settled in Israel.
