(Continued from Page 1) merican policies were made in Washington, not at the United Nations. "As long as he represents the policy of his Government," one Arab ambassador said who asked not to be identified, "There should be no trouble,"

To gain Arab understanding of President Johnson's appointment of a Jew, Supreme Counrt Justice Arthur Goldberg, to be new head the American delegation of to the United Nations, the State Department during the week initiated talks with the envoys of all Arab and Moslem countries to the United States.

G. Mennen Williams, Assistant Secretary of State for African Affairs, summoned the Ambassadors of Morocco, Algeria, Tunisia, Libya the Sudan, five Arab and states considered to be less extreme on Israel than the six states bordering immediately on the Jewish State. Mr. Williams assured the five Moslem representatives that Mr. Goldberg would deal objectively with every nation and not allow previous Zionist sympathies to deter him from fair and friendly relations with Arab members of the United Nations.
