JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

NEW YORK (NWS) A charge that Rabbi Morris Appleman, spiritual leader of the East Nassau Hebrew Congregation in Soysset, Long Island, was conducting a "bar mitzvah factory" and kosher catering business under rabbinic cloak was made by a group of Soysset residents in a complaint they filed with the local Town Board.

ALBANY (WNS) Fourteen tombstones were overturned and a number of others were smeared with defamatory slogans at the Workmen's Circle cemetary on the outskirts of this city, it was reported by an official of the Jewish fraternal order.

THE HAGUE (WNS) Dr. Hans Bloemendal, noted biochemist who has been serving as chazzan of the Ashkenazic Jewish community in Amsterdam since 1957, has been appointed to full professorship by the Roman Catholic University of Nijmegen, according to an announcement by university officials.

NEW YORK (WNS) Disclosure that two Soviet Government officials in charge of religious affairs had promised him certain concessions to meet the religious needs of Soviet Jewry was made by Rabbi David B. Hollander, president of New York Metropolitan Board of Orthodox Rabbis.

FRANKFURT (WNS) One of the longest criminal trials in the history of West Germany concluded with the conviction of seventeen of twenty defendants accused of complicity in the killing of some 4,000,000 Auschwotz death camp inmates in Poland, most of them Jews, between June of 1940, when the notorious camp was opened and January of 1945, when the camp was taken by the Soviet forces.

NEW YORK (WNS) A 1965-66 budget of \$9,488,000 for programs in Israel and the United States was adopted by Hadassah at its four-day national convention at the Waldorf Astoria, whose high-water mark was presentation: of the organization's 1965 Henrietta Szold award to Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey.

PITTSBURGH (WNS) St. Francis General Hospital, a Catholic sponsored institution, has named an ordained rabbi. and psychiatrist, Dr. Abraham Joshua Twerski, as the clinical director of its department of psychiatry, it was announced by hospital administrator Sister Mary Adele.

california temple relents on serving non-KOSHER MEALS

NEW YORK (WNS) The Pasadena Jewish Temple, one of two California congregations that had been expelled from the United Synagogue of America for permitting nonkosher meals to be served on their premises, has relented the practice and applied for re-admission to the parent organization, it was announced here by Dr. Bernard Segal, executive director of the United Synagogue.

LOS ANGELES (WNS) Reports and rumors of an undercurrent of anti-Semitism in the Negro riots were termed "not quite accurate" by a prominent member of the local Jewish community.

CHICAGO (WNS) Two eighteen-year-old hoodlums were sent to jail here for painting swastikas on the walls of synagogues.

JERUSALEM (WNS) The Central Bureau of Statistics this week released figures showing that the total world Jewish population in 1964 was 13,121.000, some 2,239,000 residing in Israel. A highlight of the report was disclosure that one third of the population in Israel is under the age

HYPNOSIS

Rogers, Di-rector of The Clinic of Prescription Hypnosis. Mr. Rogers is a veteran of over 30 years prac-tice in the field of Hypnosis and is a licensed eacher of Scientific Hypnosis and it's Ethical Applications.

Q. Dear Mr. Rogers: I have heard and read a great deal about Hypnosis and the marvelous results that are being accomplished with it. I would like very much to try hypnosis; but I'm just scared to death of being A'knocked out" or losing consciousness. Is there any way that I can be hypnotized into a light sleep that will not cause me to lose conscious-ness completely and, yet, allow me to derive some benefit from the hypnosis? Veda Mills A. There is no "knocked out state" in hypnosis. There are many depths of hypnosis, but none of them are characterized or associated in anyway with unconsciousness. You are never unconscious in hypnosis. The truth is that the deeper stages of hypnosis are characterized by increased

attention to the operators' suggestions. The profound concentration achieved is one of the principal reasons for the use of hypnosis.

Actually, hypnosis has little resemblance to true sleep. The eyes are closed to facilitate concentration. Have you ever noticed how a music lover often has his eyes closed while he is listening to the music? Even though he looks relaxed and asleep, he is really more alert; he can even follow a single theme
