LONDON (WNS) Jewish tourists returning from the Soviet Union reported that Moscow's Central synagogue was jammed with more than 6,000 worshippers during the Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services, many of them young

NEW YORK (WNS) Yeshiva University on October 31 will break ground for a 15-story, \$15 million Science Center at its main site in Washington Heights, it was announced here by Dr. Samuel Belkin, University president.

MONTREAL (WNS) More than 1,000 representatives of 220 community organizations serving 5,600,000 Jews in the United States and Canada converged for the 34th General Assembly of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, at the Queen Elizabeth Hotel.

TEL AVIV (WNS) Released government statistics showed that Israel's population passed the 2,500,000 this summer.

PARIS (WNS) Existence of twenty-two Jewish youth clubs in Poland, with a total membership of 1600 boys and girls, was reported in Warsaw by the Yiddish newspaper Floks-

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., (WNS) In 1864 the city of Leavenworth was the site of the first synagogue to be erected in Kansas. Now its Jewish community has dwindled to a point of virtual non-existence.

NEW YORK (WNS) The United Hias Service is making every effort to implement the government's program of assisting Cuban refugees to come to the United States.

MELBOURNE (WNS) Moved by a report that anti-Semitic groups were infilitrating churches to spread anti-Semitism, a synod of the Australian Anglican Church adopted a resolution urging all churches in the country to set up programs to combat racial and religious bigotry.

PARIS (WNS) Jacques Barbier, former gestapo collaborator who had been sentenced to death earlier in the year by a French military court for his wartime activities, won a stay of execution when the French court of appeals reversed the conviction on a technicality and ordered a new trial.

TEL AVIV (WNS) Former Premier David Ben Gurion last week celebrated his 79th birthday at his Negav retreat at Sde Boker, where he received members of his family, friends and political opponents. Mrs. Ben Gurion was said to have received thousands of congratulatory telegrams from all parts of the world.

NEW YORK (WNS) Some 215 Jewish leaders from 40 communities in the United States left their homes last week for the eleventh annual UJA study-mission in Europe and Israel, which opened with a conference in Rome.

NEW YORK (WNS) A gift to the Jewish Theological Seminary of America in the sum of \$3,500,000 and another to the Mt. Sinai Hospital and Medical School in New York in the sum of \$3,000,000 was made here by Albert A. List, noted Jewish philanthropist and industrialist, Born in Fall River, Mass., of parents who emigrated from Rumania, Mr. List said he hoped to make annual contributions of \$5,000,000 to his favorite causes.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (WNS) Formal U.N. condemnation of Zionism, along with anti-Semitism, Nazism and neo-Nazism, as a policy of "colonialism and race hatred," was urged by the Soviet Union representation in the General Assembly's Social, Humanitarian and Cultural Committee.

JERUSALEM)WNS) The presence in Israel for resettlement of the former secretary to Moscow's Chief Rabbi Yehuda Leib Levin was made public when it was learned that Mordechai Chazanin, his wife and nine-year-old daughter had been in the country for two weeks.

JERUSALEM (WNS) The World Zionist Actions Committee will hold its next meeting in Jerusalem on January 11-18.

JOHANNESBURG (WNS) A statement by a nationalist newspaper questioning the loyalty of South African Jews met an immediate and sharp retort from the South African Jewish Board of Deputies.

COPENHAGEN (WNS) Planned construction of a \$1, 000,000 school in Israel in tribute to the Danish people for their efforts in saving the country's Jews from the hands of the Nazis in 1943 was announced here by a delegation of the Israel Education Fund of the United Jewish Appeal following a reception by Crown Princess Margareth at Christianborg Palace, official royal residence,

PHILADELPHIA (WNS) Judge Harry E. Kalodner, a former newspaperman and one of the most prominent members of the Jewish community here, was sworn in as Chief Judge of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit.

ROME (WNS) In memory of the 2,000 Jews of Rome who were deported to the Auschwitz death camp by the Nazfs twenty-two years, President Saragat of Italy on his forthcoming visit to Poland will stop at the site of the former death-factory.

WASHINGTON (WNS) Assistant Secretary of Commerce Eugene P. Foley was reported here by the Washington Post to have declared that some Negro businessmen were harboring anti-Semitic attitudes because of belief that Jewish merchants are "aggressive competitors."
