MAPAI RETAINS CONTROL

JERUSALEM (WNS) Israel's electorate, after a long political campaign which witnessed Premier Levi Eshkol and former Premier David Ben Gurion tangled in sharp and, at times, bitter battle gave what appeared a resounding mandate to the incumbent Premier when it again turned to Mapai and the dominant political force in the country.

Still unofficial election counts appear to give the Mapai-Achdut Avodah alignment at least 43 seats in the Parliament and possibly, as high as 45. Should this be confirmed by the final and official count, it would mean that Mapai in the new government would have the same if not a larger representation than in the predecessor re-

gime.

Former Premier Ben Gurion's bloc, which broke away from Mapai and ran an independent list, received about 8.2 percent of the vote, or a total of about nine seats. It had been expected that the dissidents would draw somewhere between ten and fifteen percent of the vote at the expense of the Ben Gurion backers is wholly in the realm of speculation, since it is generally believed that both factions in the Mapai split will seek realignment and coalition rather than permit the break to go unhealed by time.

Premier Eshkol in the near future is expected to start talks on forming a coalition government. It is be-
