Governor's Statement

(The following is Gov. Sawyer's statement concerning his recent trip to California to appear at an Israel Bonds Dinner.)

It has been suggested this state would be saved much embarrassment and ridicule if I would cancel my appearance in behalf of the Bonds of Israel Sunday night.

I cannot and will not do so.

My appearance for the Bonds of Israel is a long-standing commitment on behalf of the people of Nevada. The money raised in Nevada and elsewhere for Israel has enabled that new nation to survive and become a refuge for an oppressed peoples. Our support has enabled Israel to become a full-fledged member in the family of freedom, and only continued help will enable this proud country to realize its full potential. I am proud to be selected on behalf of my state to further this cause.

The obligations of office leave no room for partisan maneuvers. So long as I serve the people of Nevada, my actions will reflect what I feel to be in the public interest. I want to build this state, not tear it down. Others will have to set their own standards.

Meet Police Chief



LORIN BUNKER

From behind a massive desk, a tall, man, with receding hair, hazel eyes, (sometimes covered by glasses,) florid complexion, regular features, and an expansive smile greets you. His name, Francis (which he refuses to acknowledge) Lorin Bunker, Chief of Police.

Born to John and Eloise, February 4th, 1910 and with five brothers and two sisters, he spent his early years in St. Thomas, Nevada (the city under water).

Depression hit the Bunker family as it did many others, and when he was still pre-school age they moved to Overton. Here he got his elementary school education, and he graduated from the Maopa Valley High, to

which he jokingly adds, if his father had not been elected to the school board, he might never have made it.

In 1928, he said goodbye to teachers and went to work for the Union Pacific Railroad. Between trips, he worked his father's ranch, where they raised livestock. After approximately three years Lorin decided that the ranch needed him and stayed with his folks until 1935 when he answered the calling of his Faith, and took upon himself a two year mission.

Upon his return, the years still remained lean, and between helping his father, he worked in the old Las Vegas Packing house, learning all the phases of the butchering trade, from delivery boy, to meat cutting. After two years in this field he joined the police department, then only covered by a small group. His pay was \$160.00 per month. He was on the force for four years until War broke out, and he turned to ranching, in Lincoln County, where he, and I quote, "starved to death". To sup-

HANOVER (WNS) Franz Huenke, a former SS officer, was sentenced to life imprisonment following a trial during which he and several other defendants were accused of having murdered 15,000 Jews in a Nazi slave camp in Latzk between the years 1941 and 1943. Huenke was convicted for having killed a Jewish professor in 1941.

TEL AVIV (WNS) Premier Levi Eshkol, addressing mustering out exercises of reservists and regulars at the close of extensive maneuvers, declared that Israel because of its strained relations with its Arab neighbors was "in a permanent stage of siege, outnumbered in men and weapons."

Speaking against the background of Washington reports that President Johnson had authorized resumption of food shipments to Egypt, Mr. Eshkol observed that the inclination of some countries to accept overtures from President Nasser of Egypt to patch up relations could be perilous to the peace in the Middle East. At the same time he cautioned that Israel's defense forces must be ready for any emergency, adding that if the order to march is given "we will carry the fight beyond our frontiers."

Actors Hanukkah Roles

Why do great stars of the stage and screen, Jewish and non-Jewish, people like Edward G. Robinson, Cary Grant, Ralph Bellamy, Henry Fonda, Eartha Kitt perform Chanukah roles? Why do television personalities like Ed Sullivan and Mike Wallace throw their hat in the Madison Square ring?

Every Chanuka, these stars appear to revive the 2,000 year-old story of the valiant Maccabees to an audience which packs every seat in America's largest indoor auditorium.

Why? Between fifty and sixty thousand people are expected to witness the Chanukah Festival for Israel at Madison Square Garden this year. Since the inauguration of the Chanukah Festival by the Israel Bond organization, it is estimated that close to three-quarters of a million people have witnessed it.

The man to answer all these questions is Himan Brown. You will find him in a cluttered section of West 26th St. On the outside of the building are the letters C, B.S. and A.B.C., suggesting associations with the world television. Inside is a spacious studio and there you will find a man who tells you that he is like all men, except his calendar is different. "When it's Pesach with you," he says, "it's Chanukah with us." Which is to say, he begins work on the Cha-

nukah Festival immediately after Passover.

Himan Brown is really a one man non-profit institution in the use of the arts of communication for the betterment of the human race. At one time a highly successful radio and film producer, he apparently did so well, that he can now devote most of his time to being a volunteer in the cause of Israel. He has a little side hobby -- as a collector of art. He is said to possess a prize collection of Renior and other masterpieces of art. The walls of his studio are covered with paintings, modernistic for the most part.

He has just returned from several weeks in Israel where he put together a documentary campaign film for U.J.A. He was responsible for the film, "The Price of Silence," attacking Soviet anti-Semitism. Another film of which he is justifiably proud is "The Fast I Have Chosen," which was done for the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies.
