TEL AVIV (WNS) Premier Eshkil was reported ready to present a new coalition government to Parliament next week after breaking the deadlock in prolonged negotiations with the National Religious Party.

TEL AVIV (WNS) The United States, Britian, France and the Soviet Union were called on to join together in guaranteeing the territorial integrity and sovreignty of the nations of the Middle East. The call was issued by Israel's Deputy Prime Minister Abba Eben who said that as matters stand in the region at the present time, a four-power doctrine in the Middle East is needed to ensure Israel's continued existence.

Murders at Treblinka

BONN (WNS) Three former Nazis went on trail in West Germany on charges of being responsbile for the wartime murders of several thousand Jews in Czenstochow, in occupied Poland.

The defendants: Paul Degenhardt, 70, former Nazi police officer; Kurt Jericho, 57, now a businessman; and Otto Loebel, 51 a law court guard, are charged with deporting thousands of Jews to the Treblinka death camp and with participation in many individual acts of murder.

In another development concerning a Nazi war criminal, it was reported that the Swiss Government is now examining Germany's request the extradition of Erhard Kroeger, a former SS

officer, who was arrested in Switverland. at a war crimes trail in Wup-


