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perhaps this planet of ours would be a better place on which to live."

During one of his trips to Las Vegas, before Percy settled here three and a half years ago, our own Hank Greenspun noted: Percy Villa is a Las Vegas visitor extraordinaire-not attracted by night life-but a sincere desire to better the lot of youth."

During the past 20 years in Minnesota, more than 100 settlement houses, boys clubs, youth groups affiliated with churches and synagogues, and any and all other organizations · concerned with youth, have been the recipients of Percy's efforts. The many hundreds of thousands of dollars raised by Percy's Committees have endowed scholarships, financed expenses for trips to Olympic competition, and rendered assistance to every method and means of keeping youth gainfully occupied.

In fact, so much money was raised in his home town, when Percy came to Southern Nevada, he brought with him funds to supply equipment for the Spring Mountain Youth Camp and for boys groups in Henderson and North Las Vegas.

We may not know "WHY" (the answer to which may be found only by penetrating a man's soul) but we certainly are acquainted with the "HOW" all this was accomplished.

It began with Percy as the Minnesota Golden Gloves Featherweight Champion, He retired from prize fighting at 20 to become the dean of boxing in Minneapolis for the Star. But he never forgot his earlier days as a newsboy fraught with all the obstacles that could deter a poor lad from a decent and honest future. He knew all the frustrations and the temptations to stray. With first hand knowledge of the causes, the cures were easy. Percy commenced organizing boys clubs and youth groups.

As the years passed, the most prominent citizens vied for the opportunity to serve on Percy's annual committees in the fund raising projects for the benefit of youths. His longtime friend and fellow Minnesotan, Hubert H. Humphrey, now Vice President of the United States, has been the staunchest supporter of Percy's youth work for two decades. At a testimonial dinner when Percy was about to leave for Las Vegas, Mr. Humphrey spoke: "Percy Villa has done a fine job for equal rights in his years of service to Minneapolis," To this day the two correspond almost weekly with the vice president constantly encouraging Percy to move to the Washington D.C. area to become involved in youth work on a national scope.

Percy was born in Jassy, Rumania. His parents, Morris and Edna, raised a family of six sons and three daughters. In 1914 the Villa's came to America to settle

"The enthusiasm was so spontaneous," commented Percy, "and all conducted themselves with such decorum and friendliness, my home is available again for any future gathering."
