

## JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

HAIFA (WNS) A successful kidney transplanting operation from a dead man to a living woman was accomplished by a team of doctors at the Ramban Hospital.

From July 15th - July 29th, 1966, Israel will play host to an educators conference under the joint-aegis of The National Council for Jewish Education (in celebration of their fortieth anniversary) and the Educators Assembly of the United Synagogue of America.

NEW YORK (WNS) The Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith concluded its four-day annual meeting with adoption of a 1966 budget of \$5,257,000 and the re-election of Dore J. Schary as national chairman of the organization.

Highlighting one of the sessions was a report charging the John Birch Society with "contributing to anti-Semitism," waging "an all-out war against the civil rights movement" and "carrying on a political crash program aimed at the 1966 elections."

WASHINGTON (WNS) President Johnson's policy on Viet Nam received the support of the vast majority of the Yes-hiva University student body in New York City.

JERUSALEM (WNS) People in the middle and higher income brackets, whose taxes were reduced last year, will have to pay higher taxes under the national budget for the coming year.

NEW YORK (WNS) Planned establishment of a library in Israel in memory of the late Moses A. Leavitt, longtime executive chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee, was announced by a group of his friends, colleagues and associates.

WASHINGTON (WNS) The State Department, replying to an inquiry by a member of the House about the motivation behind the resumption of American aid to Egypt, declared that it had investigated reported American participation in the Egyptian rocket program and that it was "satisfied that no U.S. citizen capable of making significant contributions to missile research and development have been or are connected with the U.A.R. development."

TEL AVIV (WNS) John Steinbeck, Nobel Prize winning American author and his wife, arrived for a visit during which they expect to see all places of interest in the country. Steinbeck told newsmen he wants to see everything in Israel "even if it takes several weeks."

NEW YORK (WNS) A resolution counseling interfaith dialogues only in humanitarian and cultural areas but not religious disputations was adopted at the 85th annual meeting of the New York Board of Rabbis.

TEL AVIV (WNS) The possibility of a cabinet crisis loomed large against the background of a series of disclosures that Reform and Conservative segments had been denied worship facilities by a B'nai B'rith lodge and by the Z.O.A. House.

LONDON (WNS) Hope that British Premier Harold Wilson on his forthcoming visit to Moscow will seek to secure support by the Soviet Union of a peace move in the Middle East, was voiced here by Morris Edelman, president of the Anglo Jewish Association.

CHICAGO (WNS) High praise of the United Jewish Appeal was sounded by Henry Ford II, chairman of the Ford Motor Company.

MUNICH (WNS) The Ku Klux Klan has enrolled 2,000 members from among the U.S. Forces in West Germany.

WASHINGTON (WNS) Launching of an investigation of American scientists alleged to be working in Egypt on the development of military missiles was announced here by the U.S. Department of Justice.

## SILVER LINING

In a circular sent out by the director of the Internal Revenue, Sheldon Cohen, the payment of taxes is described as an act of faith.

In an angry letter to the New York Times a rabbi takes Mr. Cohen to task for his "moralizing" and declares that we pay up to Uncle Sam only because we have to.

It is unfortunate that the rabbi finds it necessary to decry "moralizing." Would that more people were guilty of it.

Indeed, the attitude of many Americans towards the income tax is a deplorable one. In serious vein and in jests, many writers take the position that internal revenue payments are a great burden. It is fashionable to complain about taxes. Children grow up listening to table talk about the onerousness of the system.

True, it is painful to have to give up part of one's revenue. True, an enormous war load takes a big bite out of our federal income.

On the other hand, is it not a privilege to share in the conduct of government? Should we not be proud that our method of taxation is, on the whole, fair and equitable? There are, we know, ways of punching loopholes into the system, and against such devices our courts and lawmakers are vigilant.

But paying your income tax means that you are doing your part in defending our nation against enemies and providing the countless services which make our nation tick. You are a partner, by virtue of what you pay, in the humanitarian enterprises in which we are collec-

tively engaged as the People of the United States. Part of our money also goes towards extending the hand of help to the disadvantaged of the world. A small portion goes towards the sustenance of the United Nations, our shield against international anarchy.

Extreme rightist groups are constantly attacking the income tax. They would like to impose a greater burden upon the have-nots, resenting as they do, those operations of the government designated as welfare. A rabbi hardly belongs in the camp of the neanderthals. He belongs with the right and not on the far right.

So, Mr. Cohen, here is my bravo for referring to the support of our government as an act of faith. Financially, the payment of the tax might hurt a bit, but, considering what the money is used for, we also have reason for pride and rejoicing.
