Political Hopefuls Compton Files For Reelection

George Foley Seeking Election as Clark DA

Clark County's District Attorney race became even more congested when George Foley filed for the post on Wednesday.

Foley, member of a pioneer Nevada family who has a father and four brothers who are all members of the bar, was elected to the post eight years ago. He served less than two years and resigned for what he termed personal reasons.

Foley, 44, a Democrat, defeated VeNoy Christoffersen for the DA's post in 1958 in the general election. Knocked out in the primary race that same year by Foley and Christoffersen were Gordon L. Hawkins and Jack L. Pursel.

Foley is the fourth person to file this year for the DA's post. Others already entered in the race are Patrick Finnegan, Ray Jeffers and William Barker.

CURRENTLY, Foley is in a law partnership with Charles Garner, a one-time aide and chief civil deputy in the DA's office.



JUDGE COMPTON

Dist. Judge William P. Compton, a judge in Department No. 2 here since 1960 and a member of the Nevada State Bar Association since 1947, filed for reelection to the post Monday morning with registrar of voters Tom Mulroy.

THE judge is a former city attorney from Henderson, ex-assistant United States attorney and a former law clerk to Armistead M. Dobie, United States circuit judge.

Compton is a graduate of the University of Pittsburg and University of Pennsylvania. He

received his law degree (LL.B.) from the University of Virginia in 1943.

Compton, 52, is currently serving as the Eighth Judicial District's (Clark County) Judge in charge of juvenile matters.

HE IS a member of the American Bar Association; American Judicatures Society; member of the National Conference of Juvenile Judges; former chairman Clark County Chapter, National Foundation for Polio; past president of the Las Vegas Chapter, City of Hope.

The judge is a member of the local Elks Lodge, Masonic order, Scottish Rite and Royal Arc Masons; Shrine; past patron, Order of Eastern Star.

Harley Harmon Files Lt. Gov. Intentions

Harley E. Harmon, Las Vegas businessman, yesterday filed for the Democratic nomination for lieutenant governor at the office of the secretary of state in Carson City.

Harmon, 47, attended the Las Vegas public schools and the University of Nevada. After serving with the U.S. Navy, he was elected to the State Legislature as an assemblyman from Clark County. Later, Harmon was elected as a Clark County commissioner, serving from 1951 to 1963.

During the 12 years as county commissioner, Harmon was instrumental in the development of the new McCarran Field, the Las Vegas Convention Center and the new Clark County Courthouse. While a county commissioner, he led the drive to organize the sanitation district which made possible the large scale development of the Para-

A leading businessman in the state, Harmon is the president of the Nevada State Bank, Frontier Fidelity Savings and Loan Agency. He is the Past Exalted Ruler of the Elks; a member

Attorney Al Becker Seeks Court Position

Las Vegas Attorney Al Becker, former director of the city's child welfare division, Monday became the first to file for the office of Justice of the Peace, Las Vegas Township.

BECKER, 36, is former chief counsel of Local 1285, AFL - CIO International Association of Firefighters.

The race is expected to draw many candidates since the last

session of the state Legislature allowed that two justices of the peace can sit in townships with more than 100,000 population.

BECKER holds degrees of Bachelor and Masters of Law and is a member of the Nevada and New York Bar Associations. Becker said he feels his experience as criminal defense attorney qualifies him for the J. P. post.
