

JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

JERUSALEM (WNS) President Zalman Shazar, returning from a fifteen-day visit to three South American countries and the United States, was greeted by more than 1,000 cheering spectators.

JERUSALEM (WNS) Sharp divergence of opinion over economic policy, it is feared here, may lead to a serious split in the Eshkol government and precipitate a political crisis in his Cabinet, possibly necessitating a shift in the present coalition.

JERUSALEM (WNS) An Izvestia charge that Israel was "smuggling" Zionist propaganda into the Soviet Union through its diplomatic personnel was termed false and slanderous by government sources, who simultaneously noted that oncoming Jewish holidays have always been springboards for the launching of anti-Israel outbursts by the Soviet Union.

JOHANNESBURG (WNS) A warning that Orthodox Jews must not "attend services in places of Reform worship," nor participate in "any functions arranged by a Reform congregation," was sounded here by the local Beth Din a letter to the congregations affiliated with the Federation of Synagogues of South America.

WASHINGTON (WNS) An assessment of the current situation of Soviet Jewry was presented here to Secretary of State Dean Rusk by Rabbi Israel Miller, chairman of the American Jewish Conference on Soviet Jewry, who declared he was "most encouraged by the depth of concern and awareness expressed by Secretary Rusk."

BRUSSELS (WNS) Philip Slomovitz, editor and publisher of the Jewish News of Detroit, was one of the speakers at the international conference of Jewish journalists held here parallel with the assembly of the World Jewish Congress.

BONN (WNS) Normalization of relations between Germans and Jews "may not come about for a long time" though "we Germans" hope for it, was declared here by Dr. Eugen Gerstenmaier, president of the Bundestag.

JOHANNESBURG (WNS) Dr. Abraham Malamat, Associate Professor of Ancient Jewish History and Bible at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, was honored by Stellenbosch University, oldest seat of learning in South Africa.

WASHINGTON (WNS) Disclosure that the State Department was seeking the removal from the UN relief rolls of Arab refugees serving in the Palestine Liberation Army, but that it was virtually impossible to identify such enrollees without cooperation of Arab host countries, was made here by Assistant Secretary of State Douglas MacArthur, 2nd.

JERUSALEM (WNS) Syria, through UN truce supervision chief Lt. Gen. Odd Bull, has asked that Israel extend its temporary halt on the cultivation of certain areas of land along the Israeli-Syrian border. Israel ordered the halt when the UN Security Council was debating charges and countercharges of aggression by Syria and Israel. The move was made to ease the tension.

OTTAWA (WNS) A bill outlawing the dissemination of racial and religious hatred is to be introduced by the Canadian Government early in January of 1967, it was disclosed here by Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson.

NEW YORK (WNS) A cable expressing "deep distress over the practice of mass autopsies in Israel contrary to basic Jewish law and to the universally accepted concept of human dignity" was sent this week to Premier Levi Eshkol of Israel by eleven American Orthodox Jewish organizations.

BRUSSELS (WNS) Recent political developments in Rhodesia and Zambia have not affected the Jews in those countries, it was disclosed here by Maurice Wagner, secretary of the Central African Jewish Board of Deputies. Rhodesia has an estimated 6,000 Jews and Zambia 800.

TORONTO (WNS) Theft of a valuable Torah scroll was reported to the police by officials of the synagogue Anshei Lubavitch. Valued at more than \$1,000, the scroll apparently was stolen on the eve of Sabbath. The theft was discovered when a worshipper was called to take out the scroll from the ark in preparation for the reading of the law.

TEL AVIV (WNS) Israel and Syria this week exchanged prisoners, Israel receiving four men who had been incarcerated on Syria for periods from three to twelve years and Syria getting six prisoners, one of them a convicted spy. The released Israelis were reported to have "suffered terribly" and are said to be mentally unstable as a result.

sias are not anti-Semitic" but that anti-Semitism does exist "on the higher level." In those circles, they added, "there is profoundly subtle anti-Semitism." They could not point to the rationale for this development. As to the Government's position, they said it was "one of ambivalence about Jews," claiming on the one hand that the Soviet constitution expressly bars discrimination and on the other permitting a course of action that is distinctly contrary to the law and letter of the constitution--such as stamping Jewish passports with the marking "Jew" and denying Jews rights which are extended to other national and religious groups in the country.

It was the "strong impression" of the rabbis,

one of them said, that "anti-Semitism in the USSR has not been uprooted" but that "on the contrary, it is now on the increase." It was also their opinion that the Soviet Union was placing "strictures and limitations" on Jewish cultural activities which were not exercised against other nationality groups.

In Vilna, the rabbinic visitors found several rooms filled with Torah scrolls, Talmuds and rabbinic and scholarly tomes that had been rescued from Nazi burning by a Lithuanian priest who deposited them after the war in a local synagogue.
