The year 1966 is almost over. I hope it was a very happy and memorable one for you and your loved ones. It brings to mind a fact which you may not have thought of before. The Government allows each of us to deduct a certain percentage from our income for charitable purposes. These donations, when given to acceptable institutions, may be listed on our tax returns as charitable contributions. The degree of giving will of course vary according to each individual's economic level. But we should all be cognizant of the fact that we are actually encouraged to give to all worthy causes, and that the highest allowable percentage may be claimed when donating money to the Temple.

We must not over-look the fact that our Temple is a tax-exempt religious institution, and as such all monies given to the Temple may be listed in your charity deductions. I would like this column to act as a reminder to you, that

whether or not your Temple account is paid in full you should check your records with your own accountant to determine the legal maximum deductions for charity which you may claim on your tax return for 1966 income. It may surprise you to learn that you really can contribute more than the usual membership dues, High Holiday tickets, etc.

Those of you who received statements of your Temple account on or about December 5, 1966, found enclosed a mimeographed reminder to this effect, sent to you by our Executive Director. I hope you will consider this matter very carefully, because it could actually be to your advantage to make an extra contribution to our Temple on or before December 31, 1966.

I take this opportunity to wish all of you a healthy, happy and blessed 1967.

JERUSALEM (WNS) Israel will not remain passive in the event troops from neighboring Arab countries are stationed in Jordan, it was declared here by Foreign Minister Abba Eban in a radio interview in which he reacted to Arab press reports that placement of such troops was being contemplated for deployment against Israel.

JERUSALEM (WNS) Minister of Finance Pinhas Sapir, on presenting the government's annual budget to Knesset told the parliamentary body that Israel's guided economic slowdown would continue through 1967, but on a somewhat milder scale.

The proposed budget, including an allocation of \$77 million for export incentives, totaled \$1,700,000,000, an increase of \$144 million over 1966. The major allocations in the budget are four development projects that are designed to give employment to 25% of the unemployed.
