dice table stickmen wearing cutaways, white ties and tails. It was to be the world's super-spot with royalty's high rollers playing at the establishment of the king of the high rollers. But it never materialized and Nick never explained why. He never looked back. It was the next roll of the dice or turn of the card that held all his attention.

It has been said he went through 500 million dollars in his lifetime as a gambler, which would average about 10 million for each of the fifty years he was active.

You may ask, what did Nick the Greek accomplish that was productive for humanity? The answer simply, was that Nick, unlike most other gamblers, never allowed money to affect his character. He never answered, when we asked him, but from others we found that Nick had aided hundreds, including tuition for college students and financing of buisnesses for acquaintances. No one ever knew when Nick was down, but there was a barometer to indicate when Nick was riding high. At the Sands Hotel, where Nick lived recently for more than five years, Millie, the telephone operator who handled his calls, would receive an envelope with a crisp \$100 bill. rent anti-Semitic shenanigans of Father Julio Mienvielle,

Moreover, the headline was inaccurate. We would continue guilty in hundreds of tomes of church history in sermons such as the Passion Sunday, 1965 sermon preached by Pope Paul himself, in the taunts and mischief of schoolboys and their prejudiced parents, perpetuating the anti-Jewish legend of a 2000-year-old-tragedy.

Rabbi Abraham J. Heschel of the Jewish Teholigical Seminary spoke for all of us a year ago when he said of the failure of the Vatican Council: "Not to condemn the demonic canard of deicide...would mean condoning Auschwitz, defiance of the God of Abraham, and an act of paying of homage to Satan."

Yet it seems appropriate to close this visit to the provinces of ecumenical striving with the hopeful note that the same Rabbi Heschel sounded at the Religious Education Association meeting: "The world is too small for anything but mutual care and deep respect; the world is too great for anything but responsibility for one another."
