NEW YORK (WNS) The success of the West German National Democratic Party in recent elections and the participation of the party's deputy chairman, Adolf Von Thadden, in an international fascist conference, confirms the fears expressed throughout the world about the resurgence of Nazi activities in West Germany, according to a report by Dr. Max Nussbaum, chairman of the American Section of the world Jewish Congress following his return from a visit to West Germany.

Dr. Nussbaum produced evidence that von Thadden met with fascist leaders in Venice in 1962 and signed

a "European Protocol" creating a "National European Party." Other signatories were Oswald Mosley, head of the fascist British Union Movement; Jean Thiriat, of the Belgian Civil Action Movement; and Giovanni Lanfre, of the Italian Social Movement.

According to Dr. Nussbaum, the NDP avoids direct attacks against Jews because of the prevailing political climate, but nevertheless makes its message clear to its adherents through its attack on the State of Israel and its programs, including an end to the war crimes trials.

## 2nd Israel-Syria Meet Off

MAHANAYIM, Israel, (WNS) The second session of the Israel-Syrian Mixed Armistice Commission was adjourned by Lt. Gen. Odd Bull, Chief of Staff of the UN Truce Supervision Organization, when the Syrian representatives refused to reply to Israeli proposals set forth at the first session or to offer any counter proposals of their own, at a meeting at a kibbutz here on the Israel side of the frontier in Northern Galilee.

Gen. Bull scheduled another meeting for Thursday and requested Syria to present practical proposals at that time in line with the appeal of U.N. Secretary Gen. U. Thant that the differences between the two countries be

settled peaceably. Reportedly the Syrian representatives engaged in a harangue against Israel, disputing its right to its presence in the demilitarized zones in the territory near her border. Gen. Bull interrupted the Syrian delegate and asked him not to inject matters which were not part of the agenda.

According to reports, Gen. Bull opened the meeting by deploring the laying of a mine inside Israeli territory although he did not specifically blame Syria for the incident. The mine incident and the refusal of Syria to engage in meaningful negotiations at the armistice sessions tended to confirm the feelings of many informed

observers here that the Syrians were not interested in reducing border tensions. In the absence of practical solution of the border issues by the Commission, the view is that the meetings will soon be discontinued.

In a related development, Israeli Ambassador Michael S. Comay in a letter to the Security Council and at a personal meeting with UThant complained that Syrian acts of sabotage and terrorism against Israel aggravated the dispute, particularly the fact that a mine was laid by Syrian terrorists after the opening Syrian-Israeli Mixed Armistice Commission meeting, at which time both parties pledged efforts to prevent acts of violence against each other.

## HECHT, MACK, GOOT AT UJA

Sen. and Mrs. Chic Hecht, Jerry and Mrs. Mack and Al Goot will head a Las Vegas delegation to meet with some 500 Jewish community leaders representing every state in the western part of the United States who are expected to gather in San Francisco over the weekend of February 10-12 to lay plans for the 1967 United Jewish Appeal and Welfare Fund campaigns.

The Conference will be held at the Fairmont Hotel in San Francisco under the chairmanship of Benjamin H. Swig of San Francisco, Albert A. Spiegel of Los Angeles and Albert H. Kessler of Oakland are Conference Co-Chairmen.

The Conference will begin with a luncheon session on Friday, Feb. 10th. The subject will be "UJA AROUND THE WORLD". The speakers at this function will be Israel Consul Meir Rosenne, Jewish Agency Executive Vice-Chairman Gottlieb Hammer and Joint Distribution Committee Executive Vice-Chairman and Director-Gen. Charles H. Jordan.

The Saturday luncheon will be addressed by the President of the Israel Education Fund, Charles J. Bensley. This will be followed by campaign seminars for the delegates from the various communities. The Saturday Gala Conference Banquet will be highlighted by two addresses. The speakers will be Max M. Fisher, UJA General Chairman and Hon. Avraham Harman, Ambassador from Israel to the United States.

The Conference will conclude with a breakfast session on Sunday morning at which Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman, Executive Vice-Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, will deliver an address on the subject, "ISRAEL'S INTERNAL AND EXTERNAL PROBLEMS - HOW DO THEY AFFECT THE 1967 CAMPAIGN?" Also on the program will be Mrs. Harry L. Jones of Detroit, Michigan, National UJA Women's Division Chairman Leonard D. Bell of Lewiston, Maine, National Chairman of the UJA Young Leadership Cabinet.
