NEW YORK (WNS) Although the United States Government supports the principle of direct negotiations between Israel and the Arab states, it does not believe that at present "there is a reasonable prospect of a constructive outcome" for such negotiations. This view was presented in a recent letter from Assistant Secretary of State Dixon Donnelly to Moses Sochevsky, president of the Jewish Nazi Victims Organization of America. The letter was in reply to one sent by Mr. Socahevsky to President Johnson.

LONDON (WNS) A prison term of eighteen months was imposed by a local court on Colin Jordan, notorious fascist and leader of the National Socialist Party, who desecrated a synagogue at Plymouth, smearing Nazi and swastika's on the wall and doors of the congregation.

TORONTO (WNS) Showing by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation of a taped interview with Adolf von Thadden, deputy leader of the eno-Nazi National Democratic Party in West Germany, triggered a picketing demonstration estimated to have drawn more than 3,000 people.

NEW YORK (WNS) The National Council of Jewish Women has urged the United States government to act quickly "to end the continuous acts of terrorism and aggression in the Middle East," it was disclosed here by an organization spokesman who said the action was approved by the council's executive committee.

TERRE HAUTE, Ind .-Rabbi Bernard M. Cohen came to the Midwest five ears ago from Brooklyn, N.Y., to teach college students at a Roman Catholic school.

Cohen, 36, is visiting lecturer in history at St. Ma-ry-of-the-Woods College. Students in his two-hour course, "Key Figures in Jewish Culture," include three Sisters of Providence.

"This is not convert-making," Cohen said, "just understanding one another - mutual cooperation and respect."

It is the second year that a course in Jewish history has been offered by the rabbi at the college. Nine students currently are enrolled; 20 took the course last year.

The course offers a view of the contributions of important Jews in art, music, literature and science, ranging from the philosopher Martin Buber to storywriter Sholen Aleichen of "Fiddler on the Roof.

All part of the new ecumenical endeavor, the class is one of the first conducted by a rabbi for Catholics. Similar programs have been set up at the University of Notre Dame and Xavier University, Cincinnati.

"My trouble is finding a place to draw the line," Cohen said. "What makes one a 'Jewish' philosopher or a 'Jewish' historian? Just the mere fact that he's a Jew or that he is motivated from a Jewish

point of view?" He spends his spare time reviewing the work of Vatican Council II and its meaning for Jews, especially their absolution in the Crucifix-

"The full impact of the council, even to a Jew, does not rest on that one decree or any one single decree," he said. "It rests on millions of people, Catholic and non-Catholic, and how they react to the spirit exerted through the council sessions."

Rabbi Cohen was graduated from Long Island University, Columbia University and Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion. Since his ordination in 1956 and arrival here, he has managed to integrate the city's two Jewish congregations.

A rabbi of the reformed congregation, he merged the orthodox and reformed temples under the name "United Hebrew Congregation." Now, one of the temples serves as a social center for senior ci-

tizens of all faiths.

Cohen feels unity between Protestants and Catholics will not come

until there is a Roman Catholic-Orthodox understanding.

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
